

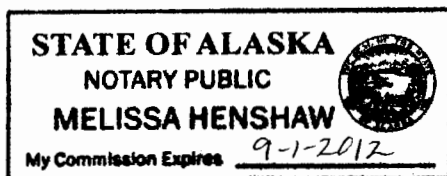

PROJECT INFORMATION

1. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

What is the aim, scope and significance of the project? The project must have historic preservation focus to be eligible.

The goal of the project is to produce Educational Historical Panels celebrating the 100 Year Anniversary of the Alaska Native Brotherhood and Sisterhood (ANB/ANS). The anniversary date and celebration will be held in Sitka in early October of 2012. The panels will be unveiled and exhibited at the celebration at the ANB Hall, and then become a traveling exhibit for schools, libraries, museums and organizations within Alaska. Upon their return, they will be permanently displayed at the historic ANB Hall in Sitka. In addition, two smaller museum quality panels will be produced to go on permanent exhibit at the Sitka Historical Museum.

Significance: The ANB/ANS formation was the genesis of the Alaska Native rights movement, and led to nearly all significant accomplishments related to land claims, voting, civil rights, hiring and benefit issues. In essence, it was the first organization of its kind on the continent. These twelve men and one woman who formed the organization started on a path towards Alaska Native rights and their accomplishments led down a road that eventually influenced Tlingit-Haida, AFN, ANCSA, and many other organizations.

The traveling panels will not only spread the story to a broader audience, but as a permanent home, the ANB Camp #1 in Sitka, a National Historic Landmark, will have the story told of the people who created it, and accomplished much.

There have been some pamphlets, papers and chapters written of this story and era, but neither a comprehensive book, nor any sort of panels that we are aware of.

Identify the intended audience(s).

School age students, native and non-native communities, museum & library attendees, and ultimately all those who visit or utilize the ANB Hall in Sitka.

2. PRESERVATION OBJECTIVES

Discuss how the project relates to annual CLG grant priorities established for this fiscal year.

Our proposal fits within priority #2, as a project that uses historic properties for

anniversary commemorations and installs interpretive signs (panels) that call attention to significant historic places and events.

Discuss how the project contributes to the goals and objectives of the state historic preservation plan.

The project fulfills several goals from the state plan, including educating K-12 students to the value of the ANB accomplishments as reflected in their historic building in Sitka, promotes preservation by providing the exhibit within the building such that visitors and tourists learn of the significance of the building, and the project brings together a partnership of a Native organization, non-profit, and state, federal and local partners.

Discuss how the project meets an identified priority of your community.

The 100 Year ANB Celebration is a proud and important event for the people of Sitka, and has been made a priority by several organizations.

Discuss how the project contributes to the development or implementation of your local historic preservation plan.

Valuing the ANB Hall with interpretation that explains what went on and it's significance is directly in-line with local plan goals.

3. PROJECT LOCATION

The project will be permanently displayed within the ANB historic building, as well as lesser panels within the city museum.

4. WORK PLAN

Explain how the work will be accomplished.

An established committee of representatives of the ANB, ANS, Sitka National Historical Park, State Museum, Forest Service and Sitka Historical Society has been meeting since June in the development of the overview of the content. Material sources have been identified and interviews for key individuals are planned for additional content. (See Appendix III.)

Either the Executive Director of the Historical Society, or a hired consultant, will develop the concept vision into specific content information. Appropriate historic photos have been identified, but not the originals for duplication. Paid researchers will attain these images for a variety of sources. (Possible researcher resume included in Appendix II)

Two different graphic artists have been contacted, as well as panel production companies, and general quotes give for the production of approximately eight to ten panels. (Includes: Bonnie Moore, Graphic Works, and Ron Klein, Northern Lights Photography) The work committee will review all drafts, and then make recommendations to the ANB and ANS Boards for approval prior to production. Shipping and display issues are being considered in consultation with state museum partner, Bob Banghardt. Shipping containers will also be constructed.

Sitka National Historical Park has provided several rare artifacts and photos that will be part of the opening exhibit.

Describe any planning studies, research reports or publications, or other sources of information relevant to the proposed project of which you are aware.

The Alaska State Museum has had extensive experience with this type of project and are providing technical support and recommendations as to process, and vendors. Our preliminary research has generated relevant information and is in Appendix III.

October 2011 - March 2012

Committee continues to meet to guide content development, and review drafts.

November 2011

Coordinating consultant hired and/or Executive Director of the Sitka Historical Society assumes role of content developer.

Paid researchers gather appropriate photo images

April/May 2012

Draft panels reviewed by committee and/or passed on to ANB/ANS for production.

June/July 2012

Panels, display hardware, and shipping crated produced.

August – September 2012

PSA and invites to schools, museums, libraries, and organizations are disseminated for scheduling exhibit showings in their community. A final schedule is developed to coordinate efficient and cost effective shipping.

October 2012

Exhibit unveiled at Sitka ANB Celebration and Grand Camp

October – December 2012

Traveling exhibit rotates through state and permanent mini-exhibit installed at Sitka

Historical Museum.

January, 2013

Exhibit permanently mounted at the ANB Hall.

The project will provide a key element missing in the existing ANB Hall in Sitka, in that it's true significance as to the founders, their accomplishments and ultimate impact is not currently told. This diminishes the importance of the building as to its historic place, not only in Sitka, but statewide and nationally. The panel exhibit will educate the public as to its true importance as a historic structure and its preservation need.

Writing & Oral History. In July I published "In Sisterhood: The History of Camp 2 of the Alaska Native Sisterhood." The 232-page full color book is a series of oral history interviews that took place over the course of seven years. The publication includes over 100 photographs gathered from private collections and historical sources. I hosted a public radio program on KTOO FM for ten years, "Southeast Native Radio," for which I interviewed many Native elders and community leaders. I have also done extensive oral research on Katie Hurley, the chief clerk of Alaska's Constitutional Convention held in 1955 for use in a future publication.

Co-Owner, Hazy Island Books. Publication of "In Sisterhood" resulted in formation of a small publishing company, Hazy Island Books (HIB). HIB recently published its second title, "Aanka Xóodzi ka Aasgutu Xóodzi Shkalneeg ," by Ernestine Hayes with illustrations by Wanda Culp (English title: "The Story of the Town Bear and the Forest Bear"). This book is believed to be the first book published entirely in the Tlingit language.

Recreational running. I have run the Klondike Road Relay, a team event, for 16 of the past 19 years. The 110-mile relay race takes place in September, and teams of 10 runners run from Skagway, Alaska, to Whitehorse, Yukon, Canada. I have run all ten legs of the race, some numerous times. I have also run two marathons, the Seattle Marathon (1989), and the Portland Marathon (2002).
