Project Description Overview

Sitka Counseling, in partnership with the HOPE Coalition, is applying for the annual City and Borough of Sitka (CBS) Human Services grant to strengthen behavioral health prevention, treatment, and community support efforts in Sitka. This funding will help sustain and expand prevention programs, maintain essential community data collection, and ensure that successful services remain available to Sitka residents.

Our goal is to continue building on the progress we have made in prevention and early intervention, while remaining flexible and responsive to emerging needs. CBS support will allow us to maintain and grow initiatives that provide education, resources, and healthy alternatives for youth and adults, creating a stronger and healthier Sitka. This includes expanding our capacity to support suicide prevention and enhancing suicide postvention efforts to ensure that those impacted by suicide loss receive compassionate, coordinated care. This initiative will provide valuable leadership experience for the youth of Sitka by actively involving them in our coalition's work. By participating in decision-making, planning, and community outreach, young people will develop essential skills such as communication, teamwork, and problem-solving. This hands-on involvement will empower them to become confident leaders who can positively influence their peers and community. Additionally, by inviting two youth members to attend the annual Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) Conference in February, we will expose them to statewide and national prevention efforts, broaden their perspectives, and inspire them to bring fresh ideas back to Sitka. Overall, this approach will encourage strength, resilience, and a lasting commitment to community wellness among our youth.

The requested CBS funds will: Support youth engagement events, food, and materials. Sustain community-wide data collection and evaluation efforts not covered by other grants. Provide resources for prevention trainings, public education campaigns, and healthy alternatives to substance use. Expand suicide prevention and postvention outreach and supports. Maintain technology, outreach, and partnership capacity to respond quickly to emerging needs.

Sitka Counseling received previous CBS grants in Fiscal Year 2005(\$23,449.00), 2006(\$15,000.00), 2007(\$15,000.00), 2008(\$5,000.00), 2009(\$20,000.00), 2010(\$7,000.00), 2011(\$5,000.00), 2012(\$3,000.00) then in 2015(\$7,000.00), 2016 (\$7,581.00), 2017 (\$4,692.00), 2018 (\$4,638.00), 2019 (\$4,714.00), 2020 (did not receive reward), 2021 (\$5,167), 2022 (\$5,845), 2023 (did not apply), 2024 (\$7,381.00), and 2025 (\$3,764).

Expected Outcomes

We maintain a community-wide data gathering and evaluation system that tracks substance use patterns and trends, monitors risk and protective factors, and measures program outcomes. This system includes local surveys, participation in the Youth Risk Behavior Survey, and ongoing community readiness assessments. We share this information with partners to guide programming and strengthen grant applications.

Success is measured through reductions in youth past-30-day use of targeted substances, increased perception of harm, higher rates of parental and peer disapproval, and reductions in law enforcement citations and emergency responses related to substance use.

Our work directly supports CBS Comprehensive Plan goals to protect public health, promote healthy lifestyles, and expand prevention and early intervention services. We provide both youth and adult behavioral health programming, offer community education, and foster healthy recreation alternatives to substance use. These strategies address alcohol, tobacco, other drug prevention, mental health promotion, suicide prevention, suicide postvention, and overall community well-being.

Statement of Need

The HOPE Coalition, representing all 12 community sectors, continues to lead coordinated prevention efforts in Sitka. Recent work includes:

- Partnering with Sitka High School to develop a pilot student support group for the 2025–2026 school year.
- Providing Youth and Adult Mental Health First Aid, Prime for Life DUI prevention training, and other evidence-based programs.
- Hosting National Recovery Month, International Overdose Awareness Day, DEA Drug Take Back Day, and Red Ribbon Week events.
- Leading safe medication disposal initiatives, including the placement of permanent drop boxes at the Sitka Police Department and Whites Pharmacy/AC Lakeside, plus a portable incinerator that has destroyed over 115 pounds of unused medications.
- Supporting youth recreation and healthy activity alternatives through the Community Recreation Work Group and partnerships with local facilities.
- Offering prevention trainings, workshops, and events for parents, caregivers, and students to address both substance misuse and mental health challenges.
- Building capacity for suicide prevention and enhancing suicide postvention outreach and resources to better support individuals, families, and the community after a loss.
- Applied for and was approved to receive a newspaper-style naloxone pickup box from SOAR WV.

CBS grant support has been critical in allowing Sitka Counseling to leverage state and federal funding for local benefit. Past city funding has helped secure:

- **Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Grant** \$125,000 per year since 2017 to address youth alcohol, tobacco, and marijuana use through a community coalition model.
- SPF-PFS Grant (2016–2020) Supported local opioid and prescription drug prevention efforts, including distribution of more than 380 overdose response kits, 260 medication disposal bags, and public education on safe storage and disposal.

• Comprehensive Behavioral Health Prevention & Early Intervention (CBHPEI) Grant — \$150,000 per year since 2019 to strengthen mental health and substance misuse prevention through partnerships with Sitka High School, Sitka Tribe of Alaska, and other key community partners.

On June 17th, we learned the Division of Behavioral Health will reduce FY26 grants due to declining tax revenues and the end of pandemic funding. Sitka Counseling faces an overall 25% budget cut, including a 15% reduction in Prevention and Early Intervention Services. Despite these challenges, we remain committed to sustaining youth programs and enhancing suicide prevention and postvention efforts in Sitka.

CBS support is also essential for meeting state and federal grant requirements for documented local government support, a factor that strengthens our ability to compete for future funding.

Organizational Capacity and Partnerships

Sitka Counseling has provided behavioral health prevention, treatment, and counseling services for more than 40 years, with a proven track record of successful grant management and program delivery. The HOPE Coalition brings together partners from education, law enforcement, tribal government, healthcare, youth services, and faith communities to ensure prevention strategies are coordinated, culturally responsive, and community-driven. Staff also serve on the Health Needs and Human Services Commission, where one of the approved goals is Mental Health, Suicide Prevention, and Suicide Postvention. This grant will allow us to further build the resources, connections, and strategies needed to advance that goal.

Sitka Counseling's board members include Stan Filler, President, Ken Davis, Vice President, Hillary Nutting, Secretary/Treasurer, Julie Platson, and Patti McPike. Our board has longevity, with some members standing for over twenty years. They attend monthly policy and direction meetings and special-purpose committees.

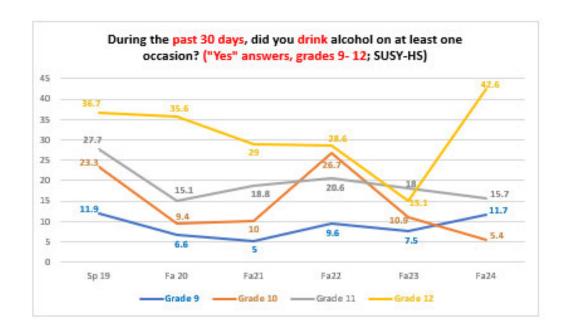
Conclusion

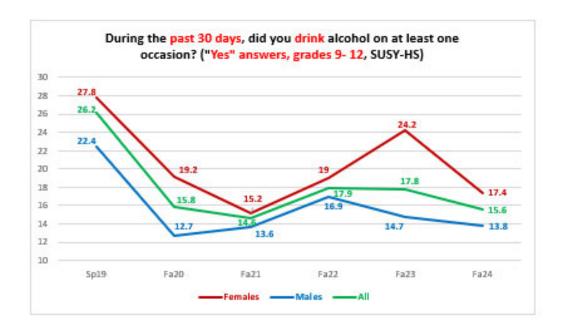

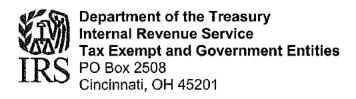
