PUBLIC WORKS ASSEMBLY UPDATE

WORK COMPLETED OCTOBER 2015

Kettleson Memorial Library Expansion:

Milestones this period

- All structural design issues have been resolved and the required changes are being incorporated into the work.
- Mechanical, Plumbing and Electrical Rough-In Complete.
- Roof Installation 100% complete.
- Window installation 80% complete.
- Exterior Finishes 75% complete.
- Insulation and Drywall 100% complete.
- Interior Paint 90% complete.
- Exterior Concrete and Paving 90% complete.
- Interior Tile 95% complete.
- Heat Pumps Installed.
- Exterior Soffit started.
- Interior Casework and Finishes started.

Future Milestones

- Interior Finishes to be complete November 2015.
- Exterior Finishes to be complete November 2015.
- Heating System Start up Mid November 2015.
- Shelving and Furniture to be complete November 2015.
- Construction is anticipated to be complete in late November 2015.

Background

The State funding of \$5.7 million awarded to CBS is a direct appropriation with no funding match requirements. A private donation of \$400,000 has also been given to the project by the John J. and Eleanor Brust Family and the City has committed \$200,000 in CPET funding and \$357,000 from the General Fund. The Friends of the Library have also raised almost \$90,000. \$350,000 of the budget was allocated to the Centennial Hall Parking Lot Project to relocate the Swan Lake storm drain, leaving a current project budget of approximately \$6.4 million for the expansion and renovation of the Library.

Harrigan Centennial Hall (HCH) Renewal:

Milestones This Period

- HCH Staff continues to facilitate public meetings in the two designated meeting rooms in Sealing Cove Business Center, 601 Alice Loop Road (Alice Island), and the Assembly Meetings at UAS. This will continue during the construction of HCH.
- Construction began August 1, 2015. Hazardous material abatement and selective building demolition is complete.
- Portions of the east and west areas adjoining the Auditorium are framed enclosed and roofed and 'in the dry'. The re-roof of the Auditorium was completed earlier; it is in the dry too.
- The new Lobby custom 'kingpin' roof trusses are installed.
- The new Museum is nearly framed and enclosed.
- The underground electrical and plumbing in the area west of the Auditorium (new Kitchen and new Electric Room) are installed and passed inspection. The new concrete slab is poured in this area.

• Roof trusses in the area in front of the Auditorium and the new Lobby are installed.

Future Milestones

- Installation of underground utilities from the west across the auditorium to the east, to be followed by new concrete slabs in the areas that are 'in the dry'.
- Continue framing and enclosing reconstructed and expanded areas.
- Continue roofing with the goal to have the full building enclosed and in the dry before the end of the year.
- Begin interior framing and finishes in the enclosed, or dried in areas, with slabs.
- Award AV Equipment contract.
- Substantial completion anticipated on or before December 20, 2016.

Background

The current funding includes four State grants totaling \$11,500,000; a \$1,991,271 FY10 Legislative Grant designated for a lightering facility visitor's center (previously planned for under the O'Connell Bridge), \$1,180,000 FY 11 CPET Head Tax grant, \$1,400,000 Marine Passenger Funds, and a \$232,620 heat pump grant for a total project budget/funds of \$16.3 million.

Baranof Warm Springs Dock Replacement:

Milestones This Period

 Alaska Department of Transportation (ADOT) rejected all bids for the project on October 2, 2015. All bids submitted exceeded the available funding for the base bid.

Future Milestones

- Redesign and re-bid project in Fall 2015.
- Construction completion Fall 2016.

Background

The City and Borough of Sitka (CBS) received a \$1,900,000 FY2013 Alaska Legislature Grant to reconstruct the Baranof Warm Springs Dock. The funding was provided with the understanding that CBS would assume ownership and maintenance responsibilities for the dock once it is reconstructed. The Assembly approved the Administrator to execute a Memorandum of Agreement with the Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (ADOT&PF) for completion of the Baranof Warm Springs Dock Reconstruction and Ownership Transfer. ADOT&PF will be reimbursed the cost of designing and constructing the improvements from the FY13 Legislative Grant.

Sitka Transient Float Replacement:

Milestones This Period

- Submittal review ongoing.
- Northern Construction Service (NCS) arrived in Sitka and began staging job trailer and containers in preparation for ancillary work beginning on the drive down float in early November.

Future Milestones

Substantial Completion required by March 15, 2016.

Background

CBS received a FY15 State of Alaska Municipal Harbor Facility Matching Grant, for the Sitka Transient Float Replacement Project, which will cover 50% of eligible construction costs not to exceed 2,700,000 in match funding. CBS has allocated a total of \$3,450,000 from the Harbor Enterprise Fund, ~\$198,000 from unspent ANB Harbor bond proceeds, and \$500,000 from the CBS Electric Fund for the project for a total budget of \$6,848,000.

Seaplane Base:

Milestones This Period

 FAA notified CBS that grant funding would not be available this year due in large part to FAA concerns over a decline in number of based aircraft.

Future Milestones

• Utilize remaining FAA grant funds to update Seaplane Base Siting Study to address FAA concerns (Winter 2015/Spring 2016).

Background

In August 2002, the Sitka Seaplane Base Master Plan was completed and includes a Condition & Needs Assessment and Master Plan Alternatives Report. The plan considered 12 alternative sites for a new seaplane base and found the north end of Japonksi Island, between the Coast Guard Base and the cove behind the SEARHC buildings on Seward Avenue was the best alternative. In February 2009, the Assembly unanimously approved Resolution 2009-35 "Supporting the development of the Sitka Seaplane Base." This approved staff applying for and executing a Federal Aviation Administration Airport Improvement Program grant for up to \$500,000 to develop the siting plan, issues resolution, design. environmental, and permitting phases of the project. Utilizing proceeds from that grant, in June 2012, an updated Sitka Seaplane Base Siting Analysis was completed which considered a new site and redevelopment of the existing site in addition to the previously recommended Japonski site. The Japonski site was again selected as the preferred site. The findings of this study were presented to the Port and Harbors Commission on April 11, 2012 where they unanimously approved further study of the Japonski Island site. SEARHC has provided very encouraging feedback on the possibility of providing uplands access for a new municipal seaplane base.

South Kramer Debris Removal and Repair:

Milestones This Period

 Began advertising bid documents to complete debris removal and road/ditch/utility repair for South Kramer slide.

Future Milestones

- Bid opening is planned for November 3, 2015.
- Substantial Completion required by December 21, 2015.

Background

The Assembly passed Ordinance 15-44 on August 21, 2015 which declared a local government disaster declaration as a result of the slides of August 18, 2015, authorized the expenditure of local emergency funds, and requested that the Governor declare a Disaster Emergency to exist as described in AS 26.23 and provide State assistance to the CBS. Governor Walker authorized up to \$1,000,000 from State Disaster Relief Funds to assist with the cleanup and recovery. These funds can be utilized to remove the debris from the right-of-way and restore municipal infrastructure to its pre-disaster condition. On October 27, 2015 the Assembly approved a total authorized budget of \$1,500,000 for all costs related to the disaster declaration and authorized the Administrator to award all bids and execute all contracts necessary to complete the remaining disaster remediation work with a total not to exceed budget of \$1,500,000.

Edgecumbe Drive Street Reconstruction:

Milestones This Period

- Public Works and design-builder hosted a construction progress public meeting on October 8, 2015. The next one is scheduled for November 19 at 7 p.m. at Blatchley Middle School.
- Completed paved roadway except portion from Cascade Creek Road to Wortman Loop.
- Completed paved multi-use path except portion from Cascade Creek Road to the crest of the hill north of Wortman, and from Kimsham to Peterson.
- Installed all curbs for the Kimsham roundabout.
- Painted the paved portion of the road.

Future Milestones

- Complete mainline paving, early November 2015.
- Complete multi-use-path paving, early November 2015.
- Install signing and striping at the Kimsham roundabout, early November 2015.

Background

The project includes drainage, sidewalk, curb and gutter, road subgrade and pavement improvements on Edgecumbe Drive from Peterson Street to Cascade Creek Road. The total project budget is \$5.46M. The Assembly approved award of a design-build contract to S&S for \$4,636,500 on May 27, 2014.

Airport Terminal Upgrades:

Milestones This Period

 Updated the estimated design costs for the design of improvements to the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) baggage screening room, and the luggage "bag bay." Provided updated estimate to TSA, who has prioritized a "Checked Baggage Explosives Detection System" project at Sitka Rocky Gutierrez Airport, based on a grant application submitted in Fall 2014. TSA indicated funds might be available in "late October or early November 2015."

Future Milestones

- Work with our design consultant, McCool Carlson Green (MCG) to provide information needed by TSA to finish processing application.
- Revise already-submitted application and send to TSA in mid-October 2015.
- If grant is awarded, amend planning contract with MCG to include design of TSA baggage screening improvements.

Background

The original project included design of improvements to the baggage makeup and TSA baggage screening areas, which will primarily be covered by a TSA grant. Funding collected from a previous PFC program amounts to \$275,000 and can be used to scope passenger-flow improvement options.

Hollywood & New Archangel Water, Sewer and Road Upgrades:

Milestones This Period

Contract with Coastal Excavation has achieved final completion.

Future Milestones

• Close grant and loans with ADEC's Municipal Grants and Loan Program.

Background

The project includes water, sewer, storm drain, pavement, curb and gutter and sidewalk improvements on Hollywood Way and New Archangel Street from Halibut Point Road to

Marine Street. Funding is available from ADEC Loans (\$750,000), an ADEC Grant (\$552,300) and from the General Fund (\$232,000) for ADEC-ineligible expenses.

Lake Street Storm Drain Rehabilitation:

Milestones This Period

 Awarded Notice to Proceed on a contract with Coastal Excavation to bolster the culvert passing Arrowhead Creek under Lake Street.

Future Milestones

- Install Cured In Place Pipe (CIPP) liner prior to December 31, 2015. Target week is November 16.
- Depending on remaining budget, take advantage of CIPP contractor's presence in Sitka to address other failing storm water pipes.

Background

The project will repair a 42" culvert passing Arrowhead Creek under Lake Street, near 701 Lake Street. The culvert is corroding and is in danger of collapse. This project was budgeted in FY15 from the General Fund (\$299,000).

Eagle Way and Old Harbor Mountain Road Utility and Road Upgrades:

Milestones This Period

• 65% plans reviewed and comments provided to consultant

Future Milestones

- 90% plans review November 2015
- Final design of the project is expected in December 2015.
- Advertisement for bids January 2016
- Construction is anticipated summer 2016.

Background

Funding for the project consists of a \$1,500,000 2013 Commerce Community and Economic Development Grant. The project will include a minimum of 24-foot-wide paved road with possible pedestrian amenities and storm drainage and a new water main and services within Eagle Way. The project will also include a minimum of 24-foot wide paved road and storm drain improvements within Old Harbor Mountain Road.

Nelson Logging Road Upgrades:

Milestones This Period

Final Phase 1 Preliminary Engineering Report Submitted

Future Milestones

- Phase 2 change order for final design
- Meetings with Forest Service and State of Alaska Department of Natural Resources
- Construction is anticipated summer 2016 to fall 2017

Background

This project includes upgrading Nelson Logging Road to include upgrading and/or replacing both inadequate bridges and the roadway to accommodate two-way traffic. The roadway is also to be moved toward the south and/or raised above the winter and spring flooding at the Starrigavan Creek estuary and eliminate sloughing off of the roadway into Starrigavan estuary. Funding for the project is provided by \$2,343,000 2013 Commerce Community and Economic Development Grant.

Ultra Violet (UV) Disinfection Facility:

Milestones This Period

Facility is functional and operational

Future Milestones

- Final Punch List items completed in November 2015
- Additional Work to add equipment change order in process

Background

The Blue Lake drinking water system is a surface water system, which must comply with the EPA Enhanced Surface Water Treatment Rules (ESWTRs). The UV Disinfection Facility will provide the additional microbial and disinfection controls required under the ESWTRs. The current total project cost estimate is \$8,966,000. Funding for this project is provided by State of Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) loans and grants:

- \$4,000,000 FY 2011 ADEC Loan (Includes \$2,500,000 financed with \$1,500,000 subsidized)
- \$2,550,000 FY 2012 ADEC Loan
- \$3,500,000 FY 2012 ADEC Grant (30% local match requirement).
- \$2,061,000 FY 2013 ADEC Grant (30% local match requirement).
 \$12,111,000 Total Project Funding

Monastery and Baranof Water and Sewer Project:

Milestones This Period

Project reached Physical Competition 10/28/15

Future Milestones

Final Completion November 2015

Background

The project includes replacement of the water and wastewater systems, new pavement with curb and gutter, storm drain improvements and sidewalk on one side on Baranof Street. Funding for the project is provided by the following sources:

- \$533,000 FY 2014 ADEC Sewer Loan
- \$497,000 FY2014 ADEC Water Loan
- \$763,000 FY 2015 ADEC Grant (30% local match requirement)
- \$102,000 CBS Capital Improvement Monastery Street FY15
- \$81,000 CBS Capital Improvement Baranof Street FY15
 \$1,976,000 Total Project Funding

Federal Land Access Program (FLAP) Grant: Phases 4&5:

Milestones This Period

- The construction crew has completed the Pherson Street access point and the trail to the BIHA property.
- MHLT is reviewing the final as-built for the portions of the trail that are on their property.
- As-built surveying is being finished up on all aspects of the trail.

Future Milestones

- Trailhead planning: bollards, trailhead signage, kiosks, and multiuse trail signage.
- The completion date is estimated around November 2015.

Background

The City and Borough of Sitka has been awarded a \$916,897 MAP-21 Federal Lands Access Program (FLAP) Grant for Phase 5 Cross Trail multimodal pathway (Cross TMP), Baranof Street and Yaw Drive connectors, by Western Federal Lands (WFL). The Assembly approved submission of the grant in Resolution 2013-03 in February 2013. Phase 4 of the project, a \$926,000 STIP Grant for a multimodal pathway reconstruction and re-routing from Yaw Drive to the CBS property was funded by the Department of Transportation in the 2009 STIP. DOT

planners, with the concurrence of Western Federal Lands (WFL) and CBS, initiated action to combine the two projects as a single \$1.8 million grant and have the project managed by Western Federal Lands for greater efficiency and cost savings.

Federal Land Access Program (FLAP) Grant: Phase 6:

Milestones This Period

• Finalize and execute a reimbursable agreement with Western Federal Lands October 2015.

Future Milestones

- Hire a consulting company for planning, design, and complete environmental and permitting sometime in October 2015.
- The completion date is estimated around May 2016.

Background

The City and Borough of Sitka has been awarded a \$250,000 MAP-21 Federal Lands Access Program (FLAP) Grant for Phase 6 Cross Trail multimodal pathway (Cross TMP), connector from Kramer Drive to Alaska Marine Ferry Terminal, by Western Federal Lands (WFL). The Assembly approved submission of the grant in Resolution 2014-06 in April 2014. The Western Federal Lands Access Program application was submitted in April 2014, and then awarded on July 26, 2014. This is listed as a FY16 budgeted project with Western Federal Lands Access Program.

Jarvis Control and Crescent Harbor Shelter Re-roofing:

Milestones This Period

• Final completion- Warranties and closeout assurances to fulfill contractual obligations and final payment to CBC.

Background

The Crescent Harbor Shelter roof was the original from the 1985 construction of the Shelter and was failing. It was replaced with architectural shingles to match the roofs planned for Harrigan Centennial Hall and Kettleson Memorial Library. The Jarvis Substation Control Building had a flat (low slope) roof. It was leaking, under-insulated, and expensive to maintain, thus a shingled gable roof and added insulation were designed and built to reduce annual operating and replacement costs. The Assembly awarded a Design-Build contract in the amount of \$185,500 to CBC Construction for completion of this project during the September 23, 2014 assembly meeting. Total project funding included \$111,993 from the Harbor Fund and \$120,000 from the Electric Fund for a total approved budget of \$231,993.

Jeff Davis Street Water and Sewer Improvements:

Milestones This Period

 Began work on Request for Qualifications (RFQ) seeking professional design services for this project

Future Milestones

- Advertise RFQ.
- Select consultant.
- Award contract.

Background

The project will replace approximately ~50-year old undersized water main with new, large diameter pipe within Jeff Davis Street. The project will also remove 3 residences on Jeff Davis from a section of failing 1930's vintage wood stave sewer and connect them to the

existing sewer main. Funding for the project is provided by the following sources; \$644,000 FY2015 ADEC Grant and \$812,000 FY2014 ADEC Water Loan.

Gary Paxton Industrial Park Dock:

Milestones this Period

• R&M Engineering – Ketchikan progressing with feasibility study of floating dock.

Future Milestones

• R&M complete feasibility study of floating dock to help determine direction of dock project.

Background

The engineering of the project remains on hold while changes to the proposed use of the dock facility continue to be considered by the GPIP Board of Directors and CBS staff. Possible changes to the original basis of design include (but are not limited to):

- 1) Constructing facilities that will be fully ready and able to accommodate a large (250 ton) sling-type boat haul out device;
- 2) Design/construct whatever configuration is chosen, so that the facility can be easily expanded in the future to accommodate container ships of the sort used in other major Alaskan ports; and
- 3) Relocate the facility to the shallower waters at the head of the cove. CBS staff prepared concept sketches of several possible layouts or configurations to be considered under #3. Please note that Item #3 will exclude the possibility of Item #2.

The project is funded by a designated Legislative Grant, administered by the State of Alaska, Dept. of Commerce, Community & Economic Development, and Division of Community & Regional Affairs. The total amount of the grant is \$7.5 million. On the local level, the project is administered by Public Works and the Gary Paxton Industrial Park Director, Garry White. The firm of Moffatt & Nichol (M&N) has been awarded a contract to provide the design for the GPIP Dock Project. R&M Engineering - Ketchikan has been hired to complete a floating dock feasibility study.

Water

Water operators responded to seven water leak calls. Four of the calls turned out to be ground water and three calls were customer side water leaks.

Water operators repaired a leak on Edgecumbe Drive. A water leak on Sawmill Creek Road was repaired as part of the Baranof/Monastery utility project.

Locates were performed at various locations throughout the distribution system for work being performed by Chatham Electric, Harry Green, Southeast Earthmovers and Jeffus Williams.

The 4th quarter disinfection by product samples were completed and results are within allowable limits. The Blue Lake inundation sampling will be completed by December 1st.

We experienced elevated turbidity (cloudiness) after the August 18th rain event. The drinking water rules require us to post a public notice when turbidity exceeds 5 NTU. Turbidity has no health effects, however it can interfere with disinfection and provide a medium for microbial growth. Our chlorine demand has not increased and the results of daily coliform testing have

been well below the regulatory limits. Our disinfection has not been adversely effected. The turbidity levels continue to decline. Staff have spent a significant amount of time investigating the cause of the elevated turbidities. They have worked closely with the hydro staff in order to perform sampling throughout the lake and at the intake. We are still gathering data, but we believe disturbed glacial silt from the extreme rain events is the cause of the elevated turbidities. Glacial silt is very fine and can take long periods of time to settle.

Water operators continue to work out the bugs with the UV facility, this includes learning how to adjust flow control logic to match the community water demands. The necessary repairs are covered under warranty.

Wastewater

Staff performed the final walkthrough of the Baranof and Monastery utility project. A few areas were noted as needing attention. The contractor has since addressed those areas. Water operators ensured all water valves were accessible and in working order.

The wastewater crew performed locates on Edgecumbe Drive and Monastery streets.

The lift station domes (the entry way into the below ground rooms where the pumps and controls are housed) and bollards were cleaned and painted.

Wastewater staff used the Camel to clean a section of the sewer main on Lincoln St.

A sewer main on Kimsham was hit by a contractor resulting in staff overseeing the repair and using the Camel to clean out debris that entered through the break.

In preparation for the Household Hazardous Waste Event, staff attended an 8 hour Hazwoper Refresher course with Steve Haavig of Carson Dorn. The course included a review of state and federal regulations, necessary personal protective equipment, hazard identification, etc.

The Fall Household Hazardous Waste Event occurred on October 4th and 5th. The event was a success and everything flowed smoothly. This year's event resulted in more household waste than the fall 2014 event. A total of 5 cartons and 13 drums were shipped out. The public was very appreciative of this service.

Wastewater staff worked on the annual cleaning of the lift station wet wells. The Camel is used to remove grease, grit, sludge and debris.

The screen on the dimminuter (grinder) at the Thompson Harbor lift station broke causing the rotating cutter to lock up. Maintenance staff were able to get a temporary fix in place until the parts are received. The dimminutor is a crucial component at the lift station as it grinds up large debris that could otherwise cause blockages or wreak havoc on our pumps.

During routine cleaning a break was discovered in the force main from the landfill lift station. This lift station is scheduled to be replaced in 2016, however repair to the line cannot wait for the replacement to occur. This will be the third repair to this line in the past year and a half.

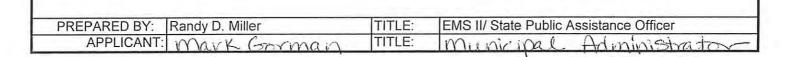

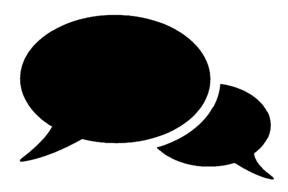

Transition of convention and visitor services

First of all, thank you for contracting convention and visitor services with the Greater Sitka Chamber of Commerce. As of October 4th, I am working full-time as the Executive Director and have been getting familiarized with the operations of both the Chamber and SCVB in order to transition all services seamlessly to the Chamber. Since awarded the contract, the Chamber has maintain visitor services transition including staffing the visitor kiosks during the remaining ship days in September and answering visitor inquiries as well as providing convention resources, welcome folders, and information to potential and future conventions. Rene Tuttle, former SCVB employee, was hired as the Marketing Specialist and has completed the 2016 Sitka Vacation Planner (provided) in addition to planning for 2016 travel tradeshows and ad placements. We are currently recruiting a Membership Coordinator and a Convention and Visitor Coordinator and expect to have these positions filled by the end of this month. The Chamber office will be moving to 104 Lake Street and will include an information center for visitors. There is a minor remodel to complete prior to us occupying that space and we have maintained our office at 329 Harbor Drive Suite 212. We have worked closely with City staff, Don Kluting on the many details relating to the transition and will continue to do so over the course of the contract.

Branding and Wayfinding Project Update

Enclosed, you will find the Major Markers for the project. The Branding Project is currently on schedule, at Branding 1b with the Sitka Brand Blueprint Manual. The Chamber has received the manual and will distribute to the Branding Committee for their final review. Once the committee has reviewed we will provide that feedback to GDS and they will proceed to the final steps, Adoption strategies and communication tools and a visit from John Kelsh to host a Brand Implementation Workshop here in Sitka.

The Wayfinding project is currently in Wayfinding 2a Develop draft wayfinding system framework, a bit behind schedule. The Wayfinding Committee has been reengaged and will meet on November 5th to review the system framework and discuss the next steps. The goal is to work through the Wayfinding plans in order for the public presentation of sign design concepts to coincide with John Kelsh's visit. The visit will likely be scheduled for January with consideration for the Christmas holiday.

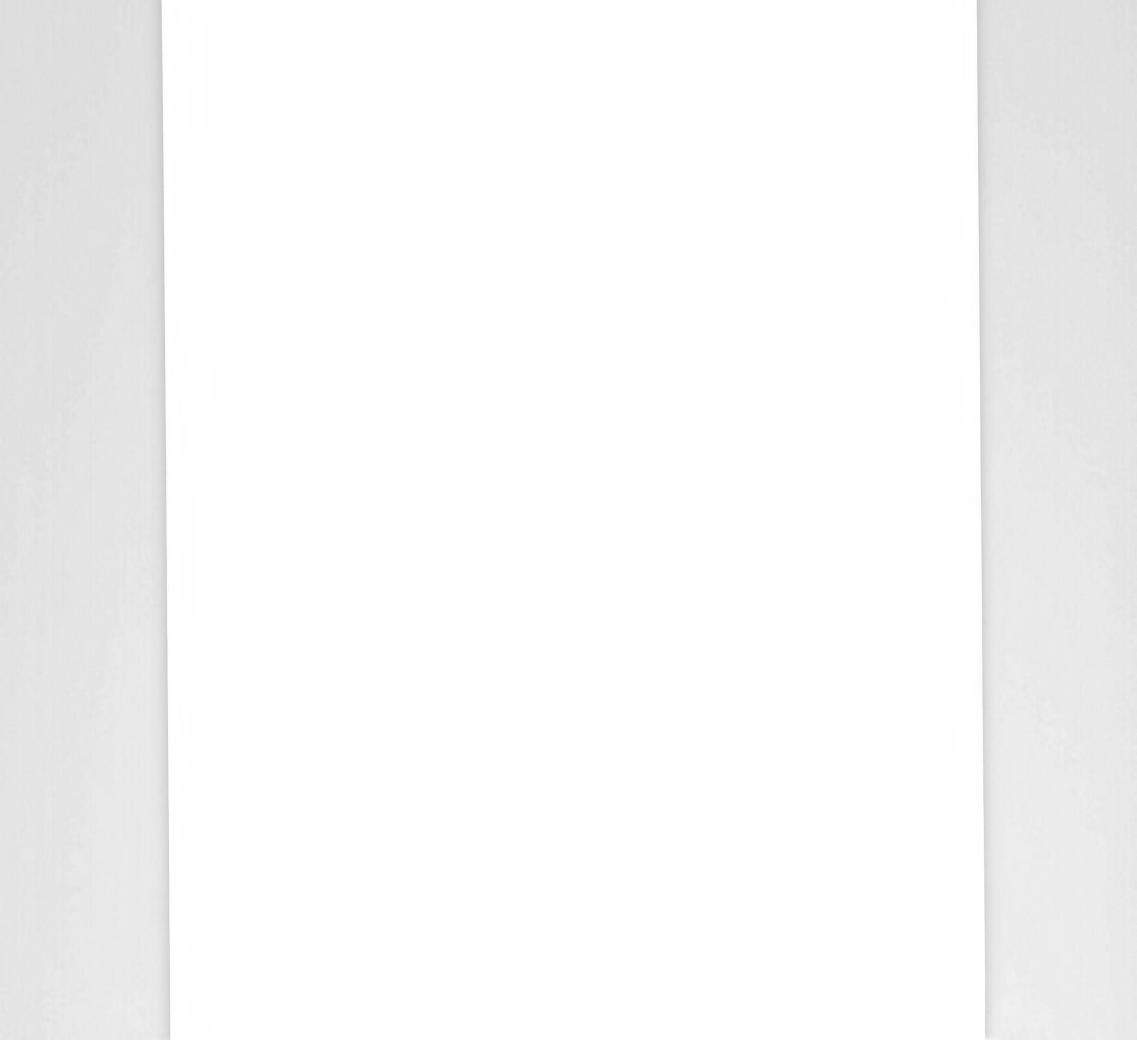

Hugh Bevan noted the passage of Item L would leave the raw water sale fund with a balance of at least \$1 million. Bevan encouraged the Assembly to use raw water sale funds to benefit the entire Sitka economy.

Eisenbeisz asked Municipal Administrator, Mark Gorman, for clarification on the intent of lines 44-46 of the Ordinance. Gorman explained he had authorization to move up to \$50,000 from one fund to another and report back to the Assembly.

Garry White, Director of the Gary Paxton Industrial Park, explained the Code as currently written was cumbersome and inefficient. He noted in other funds the Administrator had the ability to move \$50,000.

Eisenbeisz noted the intent of the proposed amendment only affected section 103 - Expenditure of net assets of the raw water sale fund. It would prevent the Administrator from using the funds to balance the General Fund budget without Assembly approval.

Gorman stated the intent was not to bring minutiae back to the Assembly but rather maximize efficiency and was consistent with the management of other funds.

A majority of members felt it was not the place of the Assembly to micromanage. Municipal Attorney, Robin Koutchak, offered the discussion was a non-issue and reiterated the Assembly ultimately gave final approval of any transfers of which they deemed appropriate.

A motion was made by Eisenbeisz to AMEND the Ordinance by removing the words "administrator or" from line 44. The motion FAILED by the following vote.

Approve Amendment No. 6 to the Alaska Bulk Water, Inc. bulk water purchase agreement

Garry White, Director of the Gary Paxton Industrial Park Board, and Terry Trapp, CEO of Alaska Bulk Water Inc. (ABWI), addressed the Assembly. White provided history of the original contract and the amendments to date. He explained substantial changes in this amendment included the authorization of an additional 36 month extension and the decrease in water allocation. White reviewed the conditions and provisions contained in the amendment. Trapp explained while significant progress had been made the reality was moving water was difficult. There were complexities with shipping and infrastructure. Trapp shared with the Assembly work that had been thus far and noted ABWI was doing everything possible to make the venture a reality.

Potrzuski expressed concerns with exclusivity and suggested exploring a contract for significantly less water and one that would give others an opportunity. Trapp explained exclusivity was important. ABWI had made a \$1.5 million investment in a loading station and didn't believe there would be room for multiple loading stations in the current location if more than one company were to become involved. Trapp added if competion were introduced it would result in a downward pressure on price.

Overall, Assembly members believed this to be a great deal for the City and Borough of Sitka and thanked Trapp for his work and long-term investment in Sitka. Municipal Administrator, Mark Gorman, reminded the Assembly that if the amendment were approved a payment of \$1 million would be due by December 8 leaving a balance in the raw water fund of approximatley \$2.3 million. The Assembly would then have the flexibility to possibly use that resource for other pressing needs.

A motion was made by Miyasato that this Item be APPROVED. The motion

Don Anderson of APES urged the Assembly to approve the contract.

In response to a question by Potrzuski; Public Works Director, Michael Harmon, spoke to the recycling line item in the budget. Harmon explained there was a cost and revenue side. Overall, recycling costs were neutral. Harmon also answered questions related to transfer station hours of operation.

Some Assembly members expressed concern that approval of the contract would mean a 21% increase to consumers. Hunter reminded solid waste rates hadn't been raised in 10 years and the increase amounted to 1.9% each year. Guevin stressed the need for a more equitable tax structure and finding ways to make the community more affordable for low and middle income families.

Municipal Administrator, Mark Gorman, noted an ordinance would be coming forward in the near future to increase the solid waste rates. He added if the Assembly chose not to approve the ordinance it would be possible to continue for a year or 18 months without a rate increase before the enterprise fund was depleted.

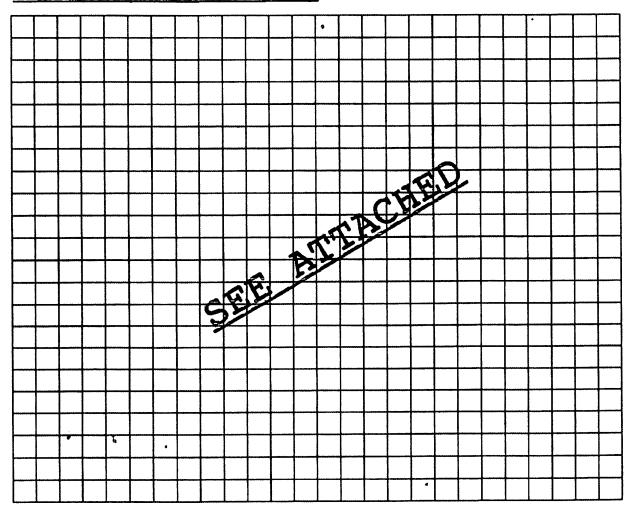

Subject: Jarvis Fuel System Improvement Project

#### Introduction:

On July 14, 2015, the Assembly approved creation of the Jarvis Bulk Tank Improvement Project in the amount of \$250,000. On August 16th, 2015 Jarvis Street Diesel Plant was identified as the source of a diesel fuel release that impacted Eagle Beach and Sitka Sound. During the last two months, the Electric Department has completed a Root Cause Analysis and a Jarvis Fuel System Condition Assessment. These reports identified areas of improvement to reduce the risk of accidental fuel discharge and to bring the system into code compliance.

#### Request:

The Electric Department requests approval to re-purpose and expand the Jarvis Bulk Tank Improvement Project scope of work to include engineering, cost estimating, and construction of additional Jarvis Fuel System Improvements identified as a result of the August 2015 diesel spill, the Root Cause Analysis, and the Jarvis Fuel System Condition Assessment. If this request is approved, the Electric Department will use funds previously appropriated for the Jarvis Bulk Tank Improvement Project to develop an additional detailed fuel system scope of work with a detailed cost estimate. Subsequent to this effort, the Electric Department intends to request additional funding to complete the additional fuel system scope identified in this effort.

#### **Community Impacts:**

CBS is responsible for taking actions necessary to prevent future releases of diesel fuel. Expanding the Jarvis Bulk Tank Improvement Project to include the additional Jarvis Fuel System Improvements will be more cost effective and efficient than performing the work independently due to overlaps in the types of services and materials required.

#### Fiscal Note:

The Assembly approved the creation of the Jarvis Street Bulk Tank Improvement Project at its July 14, 2015 meeting (Consent Agenda item 15-108). The Assembly subsequently appropriated \$250,000 for the project in Ordinance 2015-45 on September 22, 2015. Accordingly, no additional appropriation is required at this time. The Electric Department anticipates that an additional appropriation may ultimately be required; however, the amount and timing of an additional appropriation is unknown at this time. What is being requested is approval from the Assembly to broaden the purposes for which the September 22, 2015 capital appropriation can be expended.

#### Recommendation

The Electric Department requests approval to expand the Jarvis Bulk Tank Improvement Project scope of work to include additional Jarvis Fuel System Improvements identified as a result of the August 2015 diesel spill.

### HIGHWAY TO SITKA... PROVIDE EQUITABLE ALASKA

PROVIDE EQUITABLE ALASKA MARINE HIGHWAY SERVICE

CBS requests the AMHS provide adequate and consistent service to our 9,000 residents and the visitors of our community. The AMHS acts as Sitka's highway, providing core service critical to our economy. Ferry service needs to be increased to the same level as other mainline ports in Southeast Alaska.

#### PARKS MATTER...

RESTORE FUNDING ALASKA STATE PARKS IN SITKA

CBS requests the Alaska State Parks Division restore funding for the Sitka State Parks. Funding options include entering into a Memorandum of Understanding granting management rights of Halibut Point State Recreation Site to CBS, by way of a public/private partnership, for \$50,000 per year. These parks provide outdoor recreational opportunities while protecting the cultural and historic resources for all citizens.

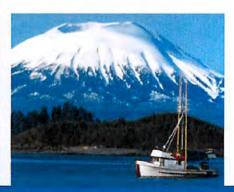

### What is your main reason for applying?

Most of my working life has been devoted to enhancing or rebuilding the physical or mental health of individuals. I worked for many years as a Respiratory Therapist in various hospital settings. I witnessed firsthand how lifestyle choices eroded individual health and had siphoned vitality from family members, which resulted in less engagement in the greater community. It rendered the community less able to focus on community enhancement activities as much time, energy and money were expended to address the ramifications of illness.

The mental health of the sick and their loved ones also erodes and can lead to behaviors that start out as palliative but ultimately enhance the cycle of further eroding physical and mental health.

Of course physical illness is not the only source of mental and emotional distress. Whatever the origins of distress that lead to reduced mental (and usually physical) health, my goal as a mental health therapist has been to help folks address what is distressing them.

Through the years I have come to believe that mental and physical health are in many ways inseparable. Healthy people will always have these habits in their lifestyle: A healthy diet, fairly low stress levels, adequate sleep, regular exercise, feelings of safety and security, a purpose in life, others who love them and who they love, and engagement in the community.

My desire to be on the Health Needs Commission is an extension of what I have been doing much of my life. The difference for me is that the focus of the Commission is more of a lifting up of community well being than the individual work I do. I find this exciting, as the community focus benefits individuals who will then be better positioned to contribute to the community. It is a complete process that I believe in wholeheartedly.

I am very interested in being a contributor to what the Commission is working on now and what they may work on going forward. As a bike commuter, I am personally invested in the "Safe Streets-Focused Drivers" policy the Commission is working on. I understand a possible enhancement is being considered which involves developing safe car to bike distances based on polices developed in other communities.

I understand that the Assembly might ask the Commission to research items such as third hand smoke, various health policies. Also I find this an opportune time to join the Commission as Doug Osborne informed me that in December the Commission will choose new goals. I would love to be a part of that.

In our relatively small community, if one is alert it possible to get a sense of the vitality, of the the morale, of how the community perceives itself and how individuals perceive their community. The work I do in my professional life and the contribution I would endeavor to make on the Health Needs Commission can be positively influential and noticeable. A bit selfishly, I would like to enhance my own satisfaction for having further contributed to raising the level of individual and community health.

# What background, experience or credentials will you bring to the board, commission or committee membership?

I recently applied to the Marijuana Commission and included my resume and other relevant information. If you could reference that I will keep this part short.

In summary, I was on the board for a citizen's group (in the Matsu Valley) that formed to stop an ill advised intertie from being developed. In the end we prevailed and the state judged the project not worthy to proceed.

I worked for a non profit organization called Friends of Matsu to ensure responsible development of Coalbed Methane in the Matsu Valley. We developed ordinances that the Borough adopted to address responsible development. The company involved was not willing to develop responsibly and abandoned the project. In the process we and an associated citizen's group led a campaign to recall a corrupt senator who was taking money from the company to smooth their way. We succeeded in getting him to resign.

What I learned from these experiences is how much a group of citizens can accomplish in this state if their cause is just, even in the face of well moneyed powerful opposition. I learned how to interact effectively and respectfully with all types of people and organizations, even with the opposition. Those projects were very activist, fighting against stopping a negative. I realize (and am relieved) that a seat on the Health Commission will be more about moving toward the positive, with far less opposition and more collaboration with various interested parties.

As I wrote recently in my application to Sitka Trailworks, "I work well in groups. I strongly believe in 'the group mind' as a powerful tool to discover the best ideas and putting them into effect. I also do well in leadership positions. I can make things happen. If I take on a task, I will follow it to its completion. I can be a leader or a follower."

The Planning Commission is recommending approval of a zoning map amendment, as a condition of a subdivision replat, to rezone Tract M of U.S. Survey 3555 from GI (General Island) to LI (Large Island). The Planning Commission's recommendation was made during their October 6, 2015 meeting on a 5-0 vote.

The 12,607 square foot parcel is located near the middle of Galankin Island, on the northern shore side. This parcel has been called Hacienda Island and at one point was disconnected from Galankin Island and therefore was zoned GI. Tract M is now connected with Galankin Island, which is zoned LI.

The rezoning would create uniform zoning on Galankin Island, which satisfies the intent of the comprehensive plan, zoning code, and creates harmony among existing Galankin Island uses and lots.

The Comprehensive Plan states under section 2.4.5, "To encourage logical growth and development adjacent to existing services and facilities and to discourage discontiguous, leapfrog development and zoning and section 2.4.19.B, "Rezonings may be considered in areas where excessive need exists for conditional uses, variances and/or relief from existing requirements."

The LI Large Island zoning district: "is intended to replace the open rural low density district. Its goals include protecting the residential character of the larger subdivided islands. It is intended to cover islands such Middle Island, Long Island, and Galankin. Islands with seven lots or more may be included in this zone. An objective of this zone is to have developments

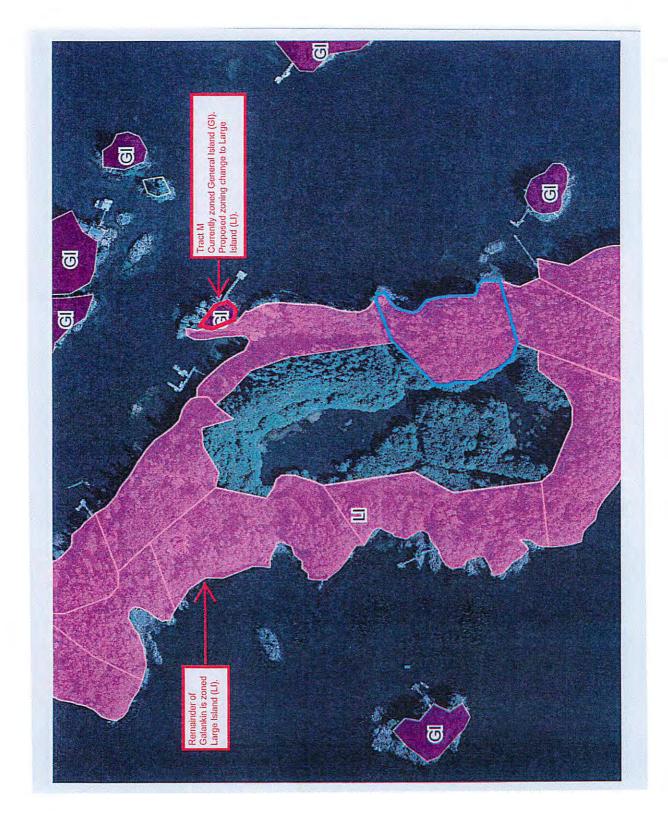
swerved by access easements built to a defined standard and to have potential moorage areas defined."

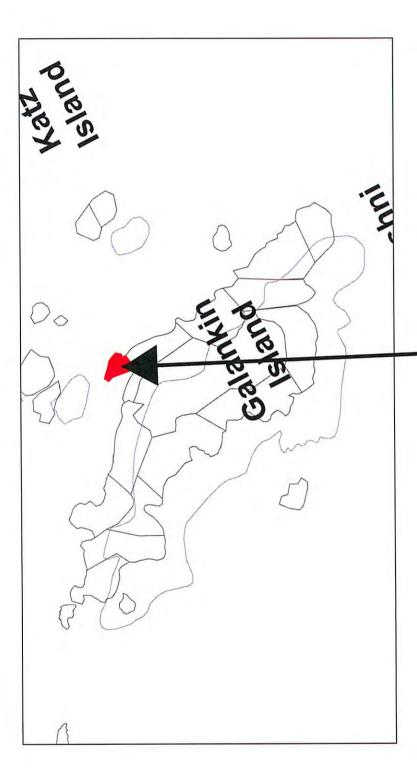
The Planning Department Staff recommend this Zoning Map Amendment. There were no public comments received against, but there was neighbor support for the change.

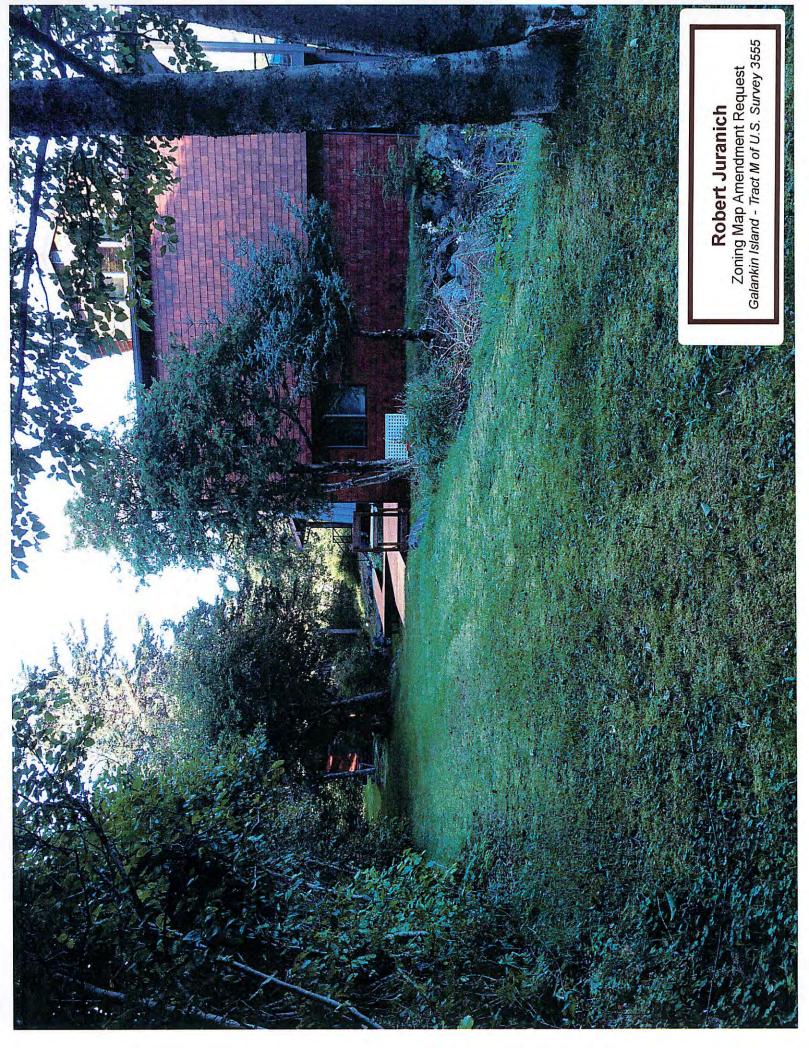

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

The applicant and owner of Tract M and the common owners of the adjacent parcel known as the common area requested at the September 15th Planning Commission a replat in which the center line between the two lots is to be removed to create one large lot. The new lot will be a total of 24,418 sq. ft. The Planning Commission unanimously approved the replat subject to a variance and zoning map amendment. This request has to do with the Zoning Map Amendment.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The subdivision, including a variance, replat, and zoning map amendment, shall conform to the Comprehensive Plan, the official zoning map, and all requirements in the Sitka General Code Title 22, Zoning.¹ Specifically, land is unsuitable for development if it is found to have potential hazards such as flooding, high water table, or other features, which may be detrimental to the health, safety, or general welfare of existing and future residents; and therefore should not be developed *unless* hazards are eliminated by approved design or construction plans.²

Galankin Island is primarily zoned LI Large Island District. The portion known as Tract M is zoned GI General Island and was at one point unattached and a smaller single lot. Through unknown processes it became attached to the main body of Galankin Island. Due to vegetation and tree growth it can be reasonable to assume that this state of connection to the main island has been so for many years (see Photos). Standard lot size is 1 acre for either GI or LI zoning districts³ (43,560 sq. ft.).

The GI General Island zoning district: "is intended to replace the open general district. One of its goals is to protect the residential character of small subdivided islands while providing for commercial uses on small unsubdivided islands of modest size and islands containing six lots or less."

The LI Large Island zoning district: "is intended to replace the open rural low density district. Its goals include protecting the residential character of the larger subdivided islands. It is intended to cover islands such Middle Island, Long Island, and Galankin. Islands with seven lots or more may be included in this zone. An objective of this zone is to have developments swerved by access easements built to a defined standard and to have potential moorage areas defined."⁵

Per the Comprehensive Plan, Islands shall comply with zoning and building codes, and zoning shall insure the long-term best use.⁶

Due to the split zoning, intent of zoning districts present, the Comprehensive Plan, and to best preserve the health and harmony of present and future residents, the development shall comply with Chapter 22.12 (Zoning Maps and Boundaries).

#### **ANALYSIS**

**Project / Site:** The proposed lot is located in GI and LI zones. The proposal will increase the lot size to 24,418 sq. ft. Conditions of approval for the prior approved replat require uniform zoning for Galankin Island in conformity with the Comprehensive Plan and concurrent Variance request.

Traffic: Zoning Map Amendment will not cause any increase in boat traffic or circulation.

Parking: N/A

Noise: No concerns.

Public Health or Safety: No concerns.

**Habitat:** No concerns.

**Property Value or Neighborhood Harmony:** Change in zoning could have future impacts on property value, while an approved replat will have positive impacts on property value. Uniform

zoning will create greater neighborhood harmony due to same types of allowable use. In addition, current uses that are legally nonconforming may continue.

VARIANCE REQUEST 515 VERSTOVIA STREET PADDY HANSEN

Public hearing and consideration of a variance request filed by Paddy Hansen for 515 Verstovia Street. The variance request is for a reduction in the western rear setback from 10 to 3 feet and the northern rear setback from 10 to 6 feet for the construction of a covered patio and the construction of a porch. The property is also known as Lot 1, Block 2, Sirstad Addition #3. The request is filed by the Paddy Hansen. The owners of record are Paddy and Deena Hansen.

Chair Spivey offered to recuse himself due to having a business relationship with Mr. Hansen. He stated that he could participate in an unbiased fashion, and the other commissioners agreed that he could participate in the proceedings.

**STAFF REPORT:** Scarcelli described the variance request and the previously approved variance for the property. The property has geographic constraints due to having two front setbacks. Scarcelli stated that an informal complaint had been received about the proposal. The northern border is shielded by foliage and a steel building. These new structures would result in the property reaching maximum building coverage as outlined by municipal code.

**APPLICANT:** Paddy Hansen stated that he had nothing to add, and that the staff report was comprehensive.

**COMMISSIONER DELIBERATION:** Commissioner Spivey clarified that the western setback request was previously approved, and that the northern setback is a new request.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** No public comment.

**ACTION:** Motion **PASSED unanimously 5-0** on a voice vote.

MOTION: M/S HUGHEY/POHLMAN: moved to approve a variance request filed by Paddy Hansen for 515 Verstovia Street. The variance request is for a reduction in the western rear setback from 10 to 3 feet and the northern rear setback from 10 to 6 feet for the construction of a covered patio and the construction of a porch. The property is also known as Lot 1, Block 2, Sirstad Addition #3. The request is filed by the Paddy Hansen. The owners of record are Paddy and Deena Hansen.

**ACTION:** Motion **PASSED unanimously 5-0** on a voice vote.

# VARIANCE REQUEST TRACT M AND IMMEDIATELY ADJACENT WESTERLY COMMON AREA OF GALANKIN ISLAND ROBERT JURANICH

Public hearing and consideration of a variance request for Tract M and immediately adjacent westerly common area of Galankin Island. The variance request would permit the creation of an

undersized lot. The property is also known as Tract M of U.S. Survey 3555 and adjacent common area of Galankin Island Subdivision. The request is filed by Robert Juranich. The owners of record are Robert and Marilyn Juranich and Galankin Islanders, Inc.

STAFF REPORT: Scarcelli explained that this was a carryover from a replat approved on September 15 on the condition of variance and zoning map amendment approval. The proposal will create a larger lot, moving toward conformity with minimum lot requirements. The current lot is 28.9% of the minimum lot requirement, and the proposed lot will be 56% of the minimum lot requirement. The Large Island (LI) district is intended for islands such as Galankin, as specified in SGC 22.16.135. LI is intended for islands with seven or more lots.

**APPLICANT:** Sue Litman represented Mr. Juranich. She stated that nothing has changed in the plans, and that she agreed with staff analysis.

**COMMISSIONER DELIBERATION:** Windsor stated that he has spoken with three neighbors, and they have all been supportive of Juranich's proposal.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** No public comment.

MOTION: M/S WINDSOR/POHLMAN: moved to adopt the following findings:

Required Findings for Variances Involving Major Structures or Expansions. Before any variance is granted, it shall be shown:

- a. That there are special circumstances to the intended use that do not apply generally to the other properties. Special circumstances may include the shape of the parcel, the topography of the lot, the size or dimensions of the parcel, the orientation or placement of existing structures, or other circumstances that are outside the control of the property owner, specifically the initial independent nature of Tract M (Hacienda Island, 12,607 sq. ft.) and its current connected status to Galankin Island;
- b. The variance is necessary for the preservation and enjoyment of a substantial property right of use possessed by other properties but are denied to this parcel; such uses may include the placement of garages or the expansion of structures that are commonly constructed on other parcels in the vicinity, specifically, other properties on Galankin Island enjoy larger lots and this would substantially increase lot size;
- c. That the granting of such a variance will not be materially detrimental to the public welfare or injurious to the property, nearby parcels or public infrastructure, specifically, this variance would allow an increase to lot size adding greater buffers to existing single-family home and to adjacent land-owners; and
- d. That the granting of such a variance will not adversely affect the comprehensive plan, specifically, will lead to moving towards conformity with development standards.

The zoning map amendment would change the zoning of Tract M from GI to LI. The property is also known as Tract M of U.S. Survey 3555 of Galankin Island Subdivision. **COMMISSIONER DELIBERATION:** Windsor stated that he has spoken with three neighbors, and they have all been supportive of Juranich's proposal.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** No public comment.

MOTION: M/S WINDSOR/POHLMAN moved to adopt the following findings:

- 1. That the granting of such zoning map amendment will not adversely affect the Comprehensive Plan, and it is consistent with Comprehensive Plan 2.4.5 To encourage logical growth and development adjacent to existing services and facilities and to discourage discontiguous, leapfrog development and zoning; and 2.4.19.B Rezonings may be considered in areas where excessive need exists for conditional uses, variances and/or relief from existing requirements.

**ACTION:** Motion **PASSED unanimously 5-0** on a voice vote.

#### CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT 601 LINCOLN STREET, UNIT A KENT BOVEE

Public hearing and consideration of a conditional use permit for a short-term rental at 601 Lincoln Street Unit A. The property is also known as Lot 3, Block 13, Gregory Subdivision, U.S. Survey 1474. The request is filed by Kent Bovee. The owner of record is Bovee Irrevocable Children's Trust.

**STAFF REPORT:** Scarcelli described the short-term rental request and the property's features. The property has two units. The bottom unit is a long-term rental and the top unit is intended to become a short-term rental. The short-term rental will be primarily rented during the summer, with year-round availability as necessary. No signs are proposed. The property has sufficient parking for the two units. The proposal will provide additional housing availability for seasonal visitors and will result in tax revenue.

APPLICANT: Kent Bovee stated that he lives downstairs, and his parents previously lived in the upstairs unit. They are now in a retirement home, so the family is seeking to rent out the unit while leaving flexibility for family to periodically stay in the unit. Bovee stated that he would apply for the tax account upon approval of the conditional use permit.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** No public comment.

**COMMISSIONER DELIBERATION:** Commissioners stated that, having driven by the property in the past, the parking lot is capable of holding the required number of vehicles without encroaching upon the sidewalk.

MOTION: M/S HUGHEY/POHLMAN moved to adopt the following findings

- C. Required Findings for Conditional Use Permits. The planning commission shall not recommend approval of a proposed development unless it first makes the following findings and conclusions:
  - 1. The city may use design standards and other elements in this code to modify the proposal. A conditional use permit may be approved only if all of

the following findings can be made regarding the proposal and are supported by the record that the granting of the proposed conditional use permit will not:

- a. Be detrimental to the public health, safety, and general welfare;
- b. Adversely affect the established character of the surrounding vicinity; nor
- c. Be injurious to the uses, property, or improvements adjacent to, and in the vicinity of, the site upon which the proposed use is to be located.
- 2. The granting of the proposed conditional use permit is consistent and compatible with the intent of the goals, objectives and policies of the comprehensive plan and any implementing regulation
- 3. All conditions necessary to lessen any impacts of the proposed use are conditions that can be monitored and enforced.
- 4. The proposed use will not introduce hazardous conditions at the site that cannot be mitigated to protect adjacent properties, the vicinity, and the public health, safety and welfare of the community from such hazard.
- 5. The conditional use will be supported by, and not adversely affect, adequate public facilities and services; or that conditions can be imposed to lessen any adverse impacts on such facilities and services.
- 6. Burden of Proof. The applicant has the burden of proving that the proposed conditional use meets all of the criteria in subsection B of this section.

The city may approve, approve with conditions, modify, modify with conditions, or deny the conditional use permit. The city may reduce or modify bulk requirements, off-street parking requirements, and use design standards to lessen impacts, as a condition of the granting of the conditional use permit. In considering the granting of a conditional use, the assembly and planning commission shall satisfy themselves that the general criteria set forth for uses specified in this chapter will be met. The city may consider any or all criteria listed and may base conditions or safeguards upon them. The assembly and planning commission may require the applicant to submit whatever reasonable evidence may be needed to protect the public interest. The general approval criteria are as follows:

- 1. Site topography, slope and soil stability, geophysical hazards such as flooding, surface and subsurface drainage and water quality, and the possible or probable effects of the proposed conditional use upon these factors;
- 2. Utilities and service requirements of the proposed use, including sewers, storm drainage, water, fire protection, access and electrical power; the assembly and planning commission may enlist the aid of the relevant public utility officials with specialized knowledge in evaluating the probable effects of the proposed use and may consider the costs of enlarging, upgrading or extending public utilities in establishing conditions under which the conditional use may be permitted;
- 3. Lot or tract characteristics, including lot size, yard requirements, lot coverage and height of structures;

- 4. Use characteristics of the proposed conditional use that affect adjacent uses and districts, including hours of operation, number of persons, traffic volumes, off-street parking and loading characteristics, trash and litter removal, exterior lighting, noise, vibration, dust, smoke, heat and humidity, recreation and open space requirements;
- 5. Community appearance such as landscaping, fencing and screening, dependent upon the specific use and its visual impacts.

**ACTION:** Motion **PASSED 5-0** on a voice vote.

**MOTION: M/S PARMELEE/WINDSOR** moved to approve a conditional use permit for a short-term rental at 601 Lincoln Street Unit A, contingent upon the following conditions. The property is also known as Lot 3, Block 13, Gregory Subdivision, U.S. Survey 1474. The request is filed by Kent Bovee. The owner of record is Bovee Irrevocable Children's Trust.

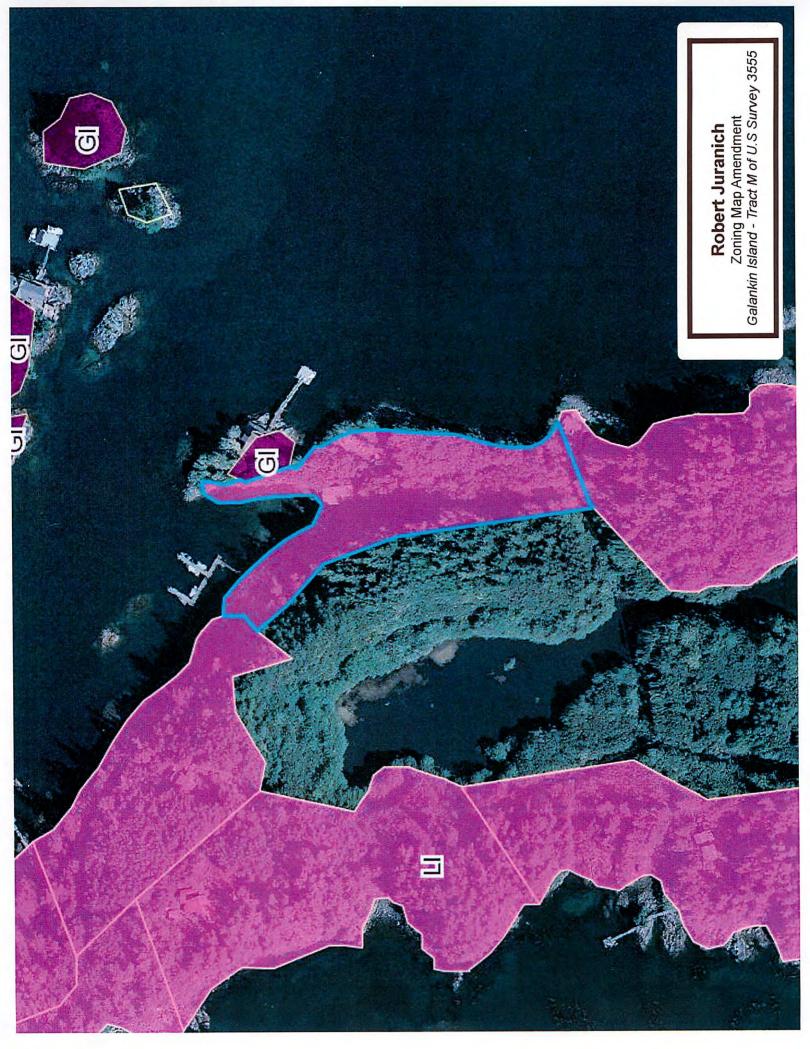
- 1. Contingent upon a completed satisfactory life safety inspection.
- 2. The facility shall be operated consistent with the application and plans that were submitted with the request.
- 3. The facility shall be operated in accordance with the narrative that was submitted with the application.
- 4. The applicant shall submit an annual report every year, covering the information on the form prepared by the Municipality, summarizing the number of nights the facility has been rented over the twelve month period starting with the date the facility has begun operation. The report is due within thirty days following the end of the reporting period.
- 5. The Planning Commission, at its discretion, may schedule a public hearing at any time following the first nine months of operations for the purpose of resolving issues with the request and mitigating adverse impacts on nearby properties.
- 6. Failure to comply with all applicable tax laws, including but not limited to remittance of all sales and bed tax, shall be grounds for revocation of the conditional use permit.
- 7. Failure to comply with any of the above conditions may result in revocation of the conditional use permit.
- 8. The property owner shall register for a sales account prior to the Conditional Use Permit becoming valid.

**ACTION:** Motion **PASSED 5-0** on a voice vote.

DIRECTORS REPORT: Scarcelli shared that the Conditional Use Permit zoning text change would be going to the Assembly on October 13th. The October 20th agenda includes a conditional use permit final annual review, a variance request, and a minor subdivision. Scarcelli updated the commissioners about the status of enforcement at 101 Lance Drive. Scarcelli stated that the commission's iPads were on the way.

**COMMISSIONER DELIBERATION:** Commissioners asked if the city provides notice about upcoming conditional use permit reviews. Scarcelli stated that staff would develop a system for tracking the status of the permits. Commissioners stated concern that code violations be enforced. Hughey stated that he would be absent for the October 20th meeting.

In the event of a vacancy on the tourism commission caused by death, resignation, inability to serve, or any other reason, before the expiration of the term of any member, the assembly shall appoint a person to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term. At the time of a vacancy, the assembly shall give public notice of no less than three days that there is a vacancy on the tourism commission, and identify the particular vacant seat as provided in Section 2.66.010(A). Any group that qualifies to make nominations as provided in Section 2.66.010(A)(1) through (4) may submit nomination(s). Any interested person who qualifies for the particular vacant seat as provided in Section 2.66.010(A)(5) and (6) may apply. However, the assembly is not limited to those applying or nominated when filling a vacancy.

#### 2.66.040 Organization.

The tourism commission shall organize itself only after all seats on the commission have been appointed by the assembly. The tourism commission members shall elect a chair and secretary annually during the first meeting of each year. Meetings are to be held no less than four times per year. # AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF SITKA AMENDING THE SITKA GENERAL CODE AT TITLE 2, ENTITLED "ADMINISTRATION," BY ADDING A NEW CHAPTER 2.66, ENTITLED "TOURISM COMMISSION"

- 1. <u>CLASSIFICATION</u>. This ordinance is of a permanent nature and is intended to become a part of the Sitka General Code ("SGC").
- 2. **SEVERABILITY.** If any provision of this ordinance or any application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance and application to any person or circumstance shall not be affected.
- 3. **PURPOSE.** The purpose of this ordinance is to create a tourism commission that will be an advisory commission to the Assembly of the City and Borough of Sitka, and that will advise the Assembly in addressing tourism-related issues.
- 4. **ENACTMENT.** NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Assembly of the City and Borough of Sitka that SGC at Title 2, entitled "Administration," is amended by adding a new chapter 66, entitled "Tourism Commission," to read as follows (new language underlines; deleted language stricken):

- B. Members of the tourism commission shall be appointed to terms of three years, except for the first tourism commission, who shall be appointed and serve terms as follows for the seats designated in subsection A:

- b. Member appointed based on nominee(s) from Sitka Charter
  Boat Operators Association; and
- c. Member appointed who is current or former commercial fishing industry worker, manager or owner;

### 2. Two years:

- a. Member appointed based on nominee(s) from Sitka Economic

  Development Association and/or the Sitka Chamber of
  Commerce; and
- b. Member appointed based on nominee(s) from Sitka Conservation Society and/or Sitka Trail Works;
- One year: two community at large members.
- C. The Sitka Convention and Visitor Bureau shall provide staff services to the tourism commission.

The tourism commission members shall elect a chair and schedule meetings to be held no less than four times per year. Minutes of all meetings shall be furnished to the office of the clerk.

### 2.66.050 Duties.

### The tourism commission shall:

- A. Advise and make recommendations to the assembly on tourism-related community issues;
- B. Assist the assembly as directed on tourism-related community issues; and
- C. Coordinate and communicate with diverse community groups on tourism-related issues, including local, state and federal government entities, business interests, non-profits, and the community at large.
- 5. **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This ordinance shall become effective the day after this ordinance is passed by the Assembly of the City and Borough of Sitka.

# AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF SITKA REENACTING SITKA GENERAL CODE AT CHAPTER 2.32 ENTITLED "STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMISSION"

- 1. <u>CLASSIFICATION</u>. This Ordinance is of a permanent nature and is intended to become part of the Sitka General Code ("SGC").
- 2. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>. If any provision of this Ordinance or any application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance and application to any person or circumstances shall not be affected.
- 3. <u>PURPOSE</u>. The Assembly has periodically established an economic development and planning commission over the past three decades (Ordinance No. 88-818, Ordinance No. 99-1538, Ordinance No. 01-1649, and dissolution by Ordinance No. 2011-05).

The purpose of this ordinance is to recreate SGC 2.32 to reenact this commission as the Sitka Strategic Planning Commission to assist the assembly in developing, planning, and implementing strategic and planning priorities as determined by the assembly. The newly formed commission will focus on strategic planning for the city rather than economic development. The Sitka Economic Development Association (SEDA), a non-profit organization established in 1997 by a committee of the Greater Sitka Chamber of Commerce, and other entities have taken on many of the economic development roles of the former Planning and Economic Development Commission.

4. ENACTMENT. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Assembly of the City and Borough of Sitka that the former repealed SGC 2.32 is now reenacted to form the Strategic Planning Commission as follows (new language underlined; deleted language stricken):

- 1. **CLASSIFICATION**. This ordinance is not of a permanent nature and is not intended to become a part of the Sitka General Code.
- 2. **SEVERABILITY.** If any provision of this ordinance or any application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance and application to any person or circumstances shall not be affected.
- 3. **PURPOSE.** On October 3, 2006 a majority of qualified voters of the municipality authorized the disposal of the "Old City Shops" property located at 1306, 1410 and 1414 Halibut Point Road for an affordable housing project without being subject to competitive bid, as previously required by Ordinance 2000-1584, and that will be available to all regardless of ethnicity. Sitka Community Development Corporation will gain ownership of Parcel 1306, along with durable affordability controls over the resale of any home built on that land, ensuring that the subsidized homes remain affordable for generations to come. Sitka has made both a social priority of promoting affordable home ownership and a fiscal priority of protecting the public's investment in affordable housing.

This ordinance authorizes and specifies the terms of the land transfer/sale; and 1) makes this parcel of CBS land available for an affordable home project; and, 2) ensures this parcel remains available for affordable housing in the future. The Municipality and the Sitka Community Development Corporation are cooperating in this pilot project. Parcels 1410 and 1414 will be transferred/sold by similar ordinance to SCDC at a future date, pending clear demonstration by SCDC that they are able to use such parcels consistent with the October 3, 2006 vote.

- 4. **ENACTMENT.** NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Assembly of the City and Borough of Sitka that:
  - A. The transfer/sale of the "Old City Shops" property located at 1306, Halibut Point Road to SCDC is hereby authorized.
  - B. This transfer/sale will allow for a cooperative project that results in promoting permanently affordable home ownership by placing affordable homes on the market as proposed by the grantee Sitka Community Development Corporation. Therefore sale by noncompetitive bid is found to be appropriate, as was authorized by vote of the citizens in 2006.
  - C. The sale price is \$1.00 for Parcel 1306. This price reflects that the Municipality
