Congratulations! The Alaska Historical Commission met on December 8, 2015 to review grant applications and make recommendations for Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) projects for Certified Local Governments. The City and Borough of Sitka application titled "Whitmore Hall Facade" was recommended for a 60-40 matching grant with FFY16 funding.

However, this grant award of \$25,000 is contingent upon the Office of History and Archaeology receipt of federal funds. We anticipate this will occur in spring 2016. Work performed prior to grant execution is ineligible for reimbursement under the HPF program.

Re: Purchase of Fire Truck

In the FY2016 budget, \$450,000 was budgeted for the acquisition of a new fire engine (page 45, FY2016 City and Borough of Sitka Consolidated Operating Budget).

Per Sitka General Code 3.16.020 a, Assembly approval of an acquisition exceeding \$50,000 may be accomplished by listing of the property to be acquired in the annual budget adopted by the Assembly.

Accordingly, Staff wishes to inform the Assembly of ongoing actions to commit to the purchase of a new fire engine from Pirece Manufacturing. Pierce has a suitable vehicle currently being manufactured which meets the Municipality's needs. Senior staff is reviewing a purchase proposal from Pierce and, if consensus is reached, the CBS will execute a binding commitment to purchase, similar to the commitment made to purchase the aerial ladder fire truck.

15-234 Alaska Clean Harbors Award and Presentation

Brett Farrell of the Alaska Clean Harbors Advisory Committee presented Harbormaster, Stan Eliason, and Deputy Harbormaster, Chuck Hackett, with an award and flag officially designating the Sitka Harbor System as an Alaska Clean Harbor. Farrell stated Sitka was the fourth harbor in Alaska to receive this designation.

15-239 Sitka Community Hospital Update - Rob Allen, CEO

Rob Allen, CEO of Sitka Community Hospital (SCH), and Steve Hartford, SCH Director of Operations, provided a brief update on the finances of the Hospital and told of an opportunity to purchase adjacent property currently owned by John Totten. Allen praised SCH staff and the positive progress made by SCH over the course of the last year. Hartford and Allen spoke to the opportunity to purchase three lots adjacent to SCH. The tentative agreement with John Totten was he would finance the property with no down payment required, interest only for three years, and the balance would be amortized over 17 years at a 5.5% interest rate. Hartford shared short and long term ideas for the property: relocation of administrative space, adult day care services, transitional assisted living facility, replace hospital rented apartments for traveling physicians and nurses, new long term care facility, and development of a state of the art clinic/rehab/medical arts facility on the campus. Allen and Hartford offered a future worksession with the Assembly would be beneficial.

At their December 8, 2015 meeting, the Health Needs and Human Services (HNHS) Commission unanimously recommended that the City and Borough of Sitka Assembly approve HNHS Commission member Lauren Hughey to serve as the official city liaison to the H.O.P.E. Coalition for a Drug-Free Sitka (see motion below).

M-Platson/S – Fribush moved to approve member Hughey of the Health Needs and Human Services Commission to serve as an official city liaison to the HOPE coalition. Motion carried unanimously.

Background Information: As a pre-requisite for applying to the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administrations' (SAMHSA) Drug-Free Community grant program, Sitka Counseling and Prevention Services has organized the H.O.P.E. Coalition for a Drug-Free Sitka.

The H.O.P.E. Coalition's mission is to "reduce and prevent youth substance use and abuse by empowering individuals and organizations through knowledge, skills and options to grow resilient, substance free youth."

Under SAMHSA's requirements, the H.O.P.E. Coalition must have representation from 12 different sectors of the community, with one of these sectors being an official representative from the local city government. Given the required time commitment to serve on the H.O.P.E. Coalition and the already full schedules of city staff and assembly, the HNHS Commission members and the HNHS Commission assembly liaison, Tristan Guevin, felt that it would be best for a HNHS Commissioner to serve in this capacity. Commissioner Lauren Hughey volunteered to serve on the coalition and was unanimously recommended for assembly approval by the HNHS Commission.

The only commitment the City and Borough of Sitka is making through this appointment is to have a member of city government serve on the coalition.

Subject: Jeff Davis Street Utilities and Road Improvement Project

Approval to Award Professional Services Contract

Background

The Jeff Davis Street water main is nearly 50 years old and is undersized, The Public Works Department wishes to increase the pipe diameter from 8" to 16". This will allow the City and Borough of Sitka (CBS) to provide adequate water to its water customers if the 16" water main in Sawmill Creek Road fails, which last happened in 2013.

The Jeff Davis Street Utilities and Road Improvements project will replace the existing water main and services, all storm water infrastructure, pavement, curb, gutter and sidewalks. In addition, four homes along Jeff Davis that are served by a clay sewer main running through private property will receive new sewer services. CBS has secured Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) funding – both a grant and a loan – to finance the ADEC-eligible portion of this work.

Analysis

PND Engineers, Inc. (PND), is a consulting engineering firm that was founded in 1979 with offices in Anchorage, Juneau and Seattle. A selection committee consisting of three Public Works staff members selected PND among the four proposers as the most qualified firm to complete this project based on their proposal, technical expertise, and availability to complete this project within our desired timeframe.

PND has teamed with Carson Dorn Inc. (for utility engineering quality control), O'Neill Surveying & Engineering (survey work) and Clearview Drilling Services (geotechnical support). The scope of work includes project management; research and site investigations; construction scoping, concept design and public process; permitting and approvals; final design; bid-phase assistance; and assistance during construction. The total estimated fee for the above described services is \$154,810. Final design is expected in spring 2016, with construction beginning summer 2016.

Re: Supplemental Budget Ordinance Re-appropriating Funds For Emergency Transformer Rebuild

Mayor McConnell and Assembly Members,

At its meeting on November 24, 2015, the Administrator and Electric Department Director addressed the Assembly as to an imminent emergency stemming from the non-operational status of the spare single phase reserve transformer at the Marine Street Substation. In their comments, the Administrator and Electric Department Director described how lack of a functional spare transformer would subject the Municipality to weeks of rolling blackouts were one of the primary transformers to fail. The Administrator further spoke to how he was going to embark on taking immediate action to address the problem by having the existing spare transformer rebuilt as quickly as possible.

Even though the emergency situation was discussed with the Assembly on November 24 and no objection was raised by the Assembly to the Administrator's proposed actions, an appropriation is still required per the Home Rule Charter of the City and Borough of Sitka. A sufficient unspent appropriation exists in the Diesel Plant fuel account (200-600-603-852-5203.005) to cover the cost of the transformer rebuild, but Assembly approval of a supplemental budget ordinance is required to reappropriate the funds, as the rebuild will be a capital expenditure (HRC Article XI, Section 11.11 B).

Accordingly, a major purpose of the attached ordinance is to accomplish re-appropriation of funds necessary to pay for the transformer rebuild. It is important to note that overall Electric Department appropriations for FY2016 will not increase with this re-appropriation.

In order to expedite the rebuilding of the spare Marine Street transformer, the Administrator has authorized the placement of a purchase request with a firm in South Dakota to begin the rebuilding process.

It is also important to point out that this re-appropriation is a stop-gap measure to respond to the emergency declared by the Administrator. The Electric Department will be coming forward soon with additional capital expenditure requests to mitigate the risks of rotating black-outs of the distribution system. It is anticipated that these additional requests to improve the electric distribution system will require approval of additional capital expenditures.

Re: Introduction of Ordinance Increasing Solid Waste User Fees

At its meeting on October 27th, the Assembly of the City and Borough of Sitka accepted a proposal for solid waste disposal services, voted to award a contract for such services, and directed the Administrator to develop and execute the written contract form for the services.

In order to pay for the costs associated with the new contract, the City and Borough of Sitka (CBS) must raise solid waste user fees, which must accomplished by ordinance per the Home Rule Charter (Article III, Section 3.01 CBS HRC). The reason fees must be raised is that solid waste costs under the new multi-year contract will rise substantially. As the Assembly was informed at its October 27th meeting, some component costs associated with the new contract are increasing over 20%.

The accompanying ordinance enacts a new solid waste fee structure necessary to pay for increased contractual costs. The proposed rate structure was been presented to the Solid waste Advisory Committee and the Committee concurred with the proposed rate structure.

The purposes of this ordinance are to consolidate all solid waste disposal policies and associated fees into one comprehensive section; tighten and clarify solid waste disposal policies; establish a policy that failure to pay any amount of utility user fees shall be grounds for disconnection of any or all utility services user fees; establish a policy that there are no exceptions to the paying of a solid waste disposal fee regardless of the amount of waste generated; to change the rates and fees charged for various solid waste disposal services; to establish definitions for terms applicable to solid waste disposal, and, to make clarifying edits.

4. ENACTMENT, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Assembly of the City and Borough of Sitka that SGC 15.06.020 and SGC 15.06.035 are amended to read as follows (new language underlined; deleted language stricken):

15.06.020 Solid waste disposal policy and rates.

A. Junk automobiles and small trucks (three-quarter ton or smaller) may be delivered to Gary-Paxton industrial park (GPIP) scrap yard at a rate of three cents per pound. In order to promote public health and reduce littering and illegal dumping, every residential unit, business, and live aboard vessel within one mile of the Sitka road system shall be required to pay a waste disposal fee as set by the Assembly. The reason fees must be raised is that solid waste costs under the new multi-year contract will rise substantially. As the fiscal note in the contract memorandum, states, some component costs associated with the new contract are increasing over 20%.

Why bring a contract award request forward before raising user fees? The answer is that the current contract has expired and the CBS is operating under a month-to-month extension, cancellable by either party with notice. To ensure continued solid waste disposal service, it is important to act now to award the contract.

The solid waste utility has enough working capital to operate under a new contractual cost structure for several months, thus providing time to prepare and vet an ordinance proposing an increase in solid waste user fees. Eventually, however, solid waste user fees must be raised or all of the working capital in the solid waste utility will be expended.
