Dear Senator MacKinnon:

I am writing to express the City and Borough of Sitka's (CBS) deep concern that the May 12th action by the Senate and House Conference Committee on House Bill 256 to remove the appropriation of \$15.7 million for distribution of the State's Commercial Passenger Vessel (CPV) Excise Tax proceeds next fiscal year.

The current terms for allocating CPV funds were approved by the Legislature in 2010 and signed into law by the Governor. These terms were supported by the cruise industry and incorporated into a settlement agreement dated April 11, 2010. The CBS has consistently utilized these funds to the benefit of the cruise ship passengers improving access to services and public safety.

CBS receives a small portion of cruise ship passengers coming to our Southeast communities. The CPV funds have been critical to our ability to provide an enhanced and safer experience. We have worked in partnership with the cruise industry to ensure that our CPV funds are used appropriately and for the maximum benefit of our visitors.

Recent use of CPV funds in Sitka include; Harrigan Centennial Hall, Sitka Sea Walk from Crescent Harbor Park to Sitka National Historical Park, Sitka Public Library, and transportation of cruise ship passengers from Old Sitka Dock to downtown Sitka.

CBS implores the Finance Committee to appropriate CPV revenues to all eligible municipal governments. Not to do so will have significant and lasting impacts to our economies and partnerships with the cruise industry.

Board of Equalization

Attorney Schmid reviewed the legal procedures for the Board of Equalization hearings.

A 16-084 Hear an appeal, and reach findings and decision, filed by Christine McGraw in regard to Lot One (1), North Woodbury Subdivision - Parcel 2-4909-130

Assembly member Swanson recused himself stating his sister owned two lots near the McGraw property.

Mayor McConnell outlined the process for the hearing. The Appellant and Assessor would each be afforded 3 minutes to make their presentation, then each would be given 3 minutes for rebuttal, followed by a 3 minute time period for each to make closing arguments. McConnell stated the hearing would then be closed and the Board would determine whether the assessment was unequal, excessive, improper, or undervalued and clearly state the findings of fact relied on to reach the decision. Appellant presentation - Chris McGraw, agent for Christine McGraw, stated the property had development restrictions that occurred from the August 18, 2015 landslide event. McGraw added that if construction wasn't allowed on a residential lot then one would assume the property had a zero value.

Assessor presentation - Wendy Lawrence, City and Borough of Sitka (CBS) Assessor, provided property details and reminded the Assembly of the January 1, 2016 assessment date. She stated that information gathered in 2015 was used for this assessment and reminded only information prior to January 1, 2016 could be considered. Lawrence stated the subject property was purchased in 2014 for \$110,000. The landslide impacted the property in August 2015 and at that time was reassessed according to the disaster exemption. The property was taken to a 50% value and that was based upon an analysis of past practices for the CBS and best practices around the state. Lawrence stated any of the geotechnical information from 2016 would be taken into account for the next year.

Appellant rebuttal - McGraw reiterated there was no value to the property. Hunter asked McGraw if he felt there was any value in the property even to use it for parking or storage. McGraw replied no. Assembly members questioned whether or not Ms. McGraw had tried to sell the property to which McGraw also replied no.

Assessor rebuttal - Lawrence reviewed evidence that could be submitted such as an insurance appraisal, cost secure insurance estimate, or a bank statement indicating a bank wouldn't lend on the property. Lawrence stated in the absence of evidence and in the absence of market sales she felt her method was a standardized way to value the impacted area and urged the Assembly to uphold the valuation. Hunter reviewed, and Lawrence further clarified, the factors for determining whether the assessment was unequal, excessive, improper, or undervalued.

Appellant closing argument - McGraw stated he didn't disagree with the method used but reminded the Board there were three pieces of property in the subject area that were unique and different. He stated that without a comparison, cutting the value in half didn't give it the proper value.

Assessor closing argument - none.

Mayor McConnell announced the hearing was closed and the Board would determine whether the assessment was unequal, excessive, improper, or undervalued and clearly state the findings of fact relied on to reach the decision.

A motion was made by Guevin to UPHOLD the appeal value of \$52,700 for Lot One (1), North Woodbury Subdivision – Parcel 2-4909-130. The motion PASSED by the following vote.

- Absent: 2 Eisenbeisz, and Potrzuski
- Recused: 1 Swanson

Members stated no factual evidence had been submitted by the appellant and no alternate valuation to counter the Assessor's valuation.

A motion was made by Miyasato to APPROVE the following findings of fact and conclusions of law based upon the evidence and argument presented at the hearing of May 2, 2016 for Lot One (1), North Woodbury Subdivision - Parcel 2-4909-130.

1) No factual or written evidence was presented by the appellant that appellant's property had zero value.

2) Find the Assessor's calculations were accurate and used best practices and best information available whereby appellant offered no alternative method of valuation.

The conclusion of law for the assessment is that the value was upheld. The motion PASSED by the following vote.

A motion was made by Guevin to RECONVENE as the Assembly in regular session. The motion PASSED by a unanimous voice vote.

Discussion/Direction/Decision on the employment and termination of Robin Schmid (executive session anticipated)

Administrator Gorman noted that at approximately 3:40pm on May 4, 2016, City Hall received correspondence from Keene & Currall representing Municipal Attorney Robin Schmid. Gorman stated he felt the content of the correspondence necessitated a special meeting of the Assembly.

Clay Keene, representing Robin Schmid, stated he had worked with Schmid over the past few years and at all times found Schmid to be professional and an exceptional advocate for the City and Borough of Sitka. Keene hoped this meeting would provide the Assembly an opportunity to make better what he would call a rush decision in asking Schmid for her resignation. He indicated Schmid was willing to continue through the term of her contract or at least January 5, 2017 - the date on which she would be vested with PERS. He urged the Assembly not vote in favor of the motion and instead consider what opportunities would be available in the interim to allow Schmid to serve out the remainder of her term or until at least January 5, 2017. Keene indicated he was available to assist the Assembly in fashioning an agreement with Schmid which would benefit both parties. Keene asked that the Assembly hold conversations related to Mr. Hanson and Ms. Schmid's employment/termination in public rather than executive session to ensure transparency.

Eisenbeisz stated that based on the content of the letter the municipality would no longer be best served by having Schmid as Municipal Attorney.

A motion was made by Miyasato to appoint Brian Hanson as the Acting Municipal Attorney. The motion PASSED by the following vote.

Absent: 1 - Potrzuski

Mayor McConnell asked Robin Schmid to step down as Municipal Attorney. Schmid stated she hadn't received anything in writing from the City and Borough of Sitka regarding the April 19, 2016 meeting and hadn't been given a chance to speak. She noted that what was in the letter was a request for conciliation. Mayor McConnell again asked Schmid to step down.



Background:

The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) has offered CBS Other Transaction Agreement (OTA) funding through its Electronic Baggage Screening Program for the design services necessary to construct an inline Checked Baggage Inspection System (CBIS) utilizing Explosive Detection Systems (EDS) at the Sitka Airport. The Assembly approved the application for these funds and execution of the TSA OTA agreement in August 2014. The funding amount for TSA eligible design services is based on the design fee proposal from McCool Carlson Green (MCG), who was contracted in 2012 to help design improvements to the airport following recommendations from the current Airport Terminal Master Plan.

The Master Plan, adopted by the Assembly on September 13, 2011, lays out a twophase process: (1) to complete immediate short-term terminal modifications to correct the most critical terminal deficiencies and (2) to develop a long-term financial plan to construct a new terminal building.

Analysis:

Since the initial application for these funds, Delta Airlines has become a tenant of the airport terminal and operates flights in and out of Sitka during the summer. The baggage and security screening was identified as a 'critical short term deficiency' before Delta Flights were added and the situation is exacerbated with two carriers. This situation moved Sitka's ranking up for funding improvements through the TSA Electronic Baggage Screening Program.

TSA covers 95% of the TSA security and screening system design costs. MCG has submitted a proposal to design the improvements to the TSA baggage screening room

for \$138,278 plus eligible Consultant and Owner expenses of \$28,637, for a total of \$166,915. 95% of that amount, or \$158,569.25, is reimbursable by the TSA OTA. When the design is complete and has been bid, CBS will need to submit a separate grant application for 95% construction funding. Public Works will seek separate Assembly approval for construction funding at a future date.

MCG also identified improvements to the "baggage bay" where TSA-screened luggage is loaded onto carts that carry luggage to the plane. The cost of the design services for the airline baggage bay is \$15,364.00 plus Consultant and Owner expense. This cost is not TSA-eligible.

Fiscal Note:

The TSA OTA will cover 95% of the \$166,915, or \$158,569.25, with CBS responsible for the remaining \$8,345.75. Non TSA-eligible costs are estimated at \$23,500 for a total estimated CBS cost of \$31,845.75. The CBS funds will come from Passenger Facility Charges (PFCs) which have been collected from travelers using the Sitka airport.

CBS has amassed a \$275,000 budget to design improvements to the terminal building through the PFC program. To date, CBS has paid out roughly \$133,000 for design services and improvements of critical terminal deficiencies. It is in the City's best interest to award a contract or a contract amendment to MCG to have them complete the design of the improvements described above.

Recommendation:

Increase the Airport Baggage & TSA Area project (#90736) budget by \$158,570 and authorize the additional expenditures of these funds.

The Assembly has before it a proposal for an ordinance which modifies the locally adopted building code. The intent of this ordinance is to provide the Building Official with the opportunity to legally request geotechnical analysis for development of properties located in areas that are considered prone to landslides.

Background

In response to a series of landslides that occurred in August of 2015, the City and Borough of Sitka contracted a geotechnical consulting firm to analyze the south Kramer Avenue area, where the landslides most significantly affected current development projects. The study results included mapping of particular areas which should be considered low-risk, medium-risk or high-risk in terms of landslide potential. The consultants concluded that, prior to any development in medium- or high-risk zones, further geotechnical analysis must be undertaken. They recommended that a licensed professional address the risk (and possible remediation) of potential landslide issues on each particular plot of land.

The building department wishes to add code language to make use of this new information. The existing code, as previously adopted by the Assembly, requires geotechnical analysis for several scenarios involving unstable land and soil conditions, but not specifically for potential landslides. This proposed ordinance provides that individuals wishing to develop a lot in these risk zones need to include this analysis (and cost) in their plan submittals to the city as part of the building permit process.

Conclusion

The Assembly has expressed its intention to expand the landslide risk analysis and mapping to include the entire city. At some point, mapping all across the city will similarly indicate low-, medium-, and high-risk zones as now shown for the south Kramer area. With this new code provision, the building department will use the latest available analyses and mapping to determine where to require geotechnical studies from individual property owners. The ultimate goal is to ensure that development is properly protected from the risk of future landslide activity.

Background:

The State has completed their review of our accounting, bids, and overall paperwork related to the August 18th disaster work and declaration to fund these expenses. The total estimated cost for the past and future work is approximately \$1.5-million with a total State authorized budget of \$1-million. The State representatives will be working with us to authorize a budget increase to cover the total cost and have indicated that these are commonly approved. Additionally, the State has approved us to move forward with putting the additional work out to bid.

Analysis:

Following the State's program will generate several required contracts and procurement approvals for the various categories of work. Time is of the essence and the CBS needs to position itself to be efficient and expeditious in completing this work. For this reason, it is important for the Administrator to have the authority to award all necessary bids and contracts to ensure there is no further delay to these much needed repairs and debris removal work.

Fiscal Note:

The Assembly has authorized a CBS budget of \$1-million and the State declaration budget is an additional \$1-million. The State will be pursuing a budget increase to approximately \$1.5-million to match the current estimated total cost. It is important to note that these projects need to be completed regardless of the State's ability to increase their total budget.

Recommendation:

- Approve a total authorized budget of \$1,500,000 for all costs related to the disaster declaration work.
- Authorize the Administrator to award all bids and execute all contracts necessary to complete the remaining disaster remediation work with a total not to exceed budget of \$1,500,000.

Background

The Sitka Seaplane Base was originally constructed in 1952 by the Territory of Alaska with funding from the Civil Aeronautics Administration, FAA's predecessor agency. The facility was later improved several times by the State of Alaska and City of Sitka (later the City and Borough of Sitka), acting as co-sponsors. The City and Borough of Sitka became sole sponsor of this facility in 1977 and it was completely replaced in 1978 by WS Construction.

<u>Analysis</u>

While a 30 year useful life is typically used in Alaska communities for harbor facilities, Sitka's strong preventative maintenance program has extended marine facility life beyond 30 years. It should be noted that the Sitka Seaplane Base is approaching 40 years of age. Efforts to develop a replacement seaplane base is ongoing. On January 24th 2016, the piling supporting the marginal float to this facility failed. It was also noted that 4 out of the 5 remaining pilings are approaching failure. The facility was closed displacing 4 seaplanes.

PND Engineers of Juneau and CBS Harbor Staff performed an assessment of the facility. It was determined that many integral parts were actually in good condition, given its age. A repair plan has been developed to make this facility useable for based aircraft. By having a functional facility, this will also give the CBS a greater opportunity to obtain grant funding for a new seaplane base.

Fiscal Note

Time is of the essence given that the facility has failed which has essentially condemned the only dedicated public seaplane dock access in Sitka. The Harbor Department solicited local contractors qualified to perform pile driving and repair work of this magnitude. WS Construction was the only local pile driving contractor who responded and is available to do the work immediately. WS Construction's experience from building the float originally, having materials local that can be used and repurposed, and availability is unmatched. Through this solicitation process, and working with WS Construction, a budget of \$170,000 was developed for the project. The Harbor Working Capital has sufficient funds to cover this capital repair

cost. However, this is an unplanned expenditure that will reduce the planned reserves for future master plan capital needs.

It has been suggested that due to this unplanned cost and the additional pressure it places on the Harbor Enterprise Fund, that the Assembly consider providing a grant to the Fund from the Southeast Alaska Economic Development Fund. If the Assembly expresses interest in this approach, staff will prepare an ordinance for a future meeting to appropriate money from the Southeast Alaska Economic Development Fund for transfer to the Harbor Fund.

Recommendation

Approve the proposed FY-16 budget adjustment ordinance to fund the Sitka Seaplane Base Rehabilitation Project.
