### Background

At your December 23 and January 23, 2020 budget meetings we touched the issue of funding for the Sitka School District.

Based on what we have heard from the Assembly, staff is proposing funding schools to the cap as well as matching FY20 funding levels for additional items such as school maintenance and non- instructional items such as Blatchley Pool and Community Schools.

School funding is the single largest line item in the General Fund Budget. As such we need Assembly guidance in this matter so our Finance Department can continue to develop the FY21 budget.

The School Board will be present to discuss this topic with the Assembly.

### Fiscal Note

The proposed level of school funding of \$7,618,993 (which includes 50% of budgeted Secure Rural Schools) increases school funding in the General Fund by \$333,293 over FY20.

While there are still many items pending and if we project capital funding near FY20 levels, the preliminary General Fund budget shows a slight surplus.

### Recommendations

Provide \$7,618,993 in FY21 funding from the General Fund for the Sitka School District and seek School Board committment that this will be funding level requested by Sitka School District.

# Process and law pertaining to local funding of public education



1. By May 1 School Board must submit budget to Assembly



2. Within 30 days of receiving formal school budget, the Administrator must inform the School Board in writing of the level of local funding to be made available for public education



3. No action means that whatever is in the SSD budget will be the local contribution and the CBS budget would have to be amended to reflect the amount in the SSD budget (if different)



4. As school funding is our single largest expense, we hope to finalize the amount of local funding early, and seek the School Board's commitment to include an amount in their budget that is agreed upon by the Assembly



<sup>\*</sup>The intention is for the total disbursement plus any SRS funds to fund instructional to maximum allowable (\$7,053,234 plus keep the FY2020 level as non instructional \$358,759) but unless the assembly directs the Administrator to indicate these designations, the School Board may allocate these funds as needed, as the law does not require the CBS to direct that the funding be split between instructional and non-instructional and the CBS has not historically done so.

Dear Mayor Paxton and Members of the Assembly:

Throughout your deliberations in recent weeks, I have been encouraged by the conversations happening in regards to the City's local contribution to the Sitka School District's FY21 Budget. By the time school districts in Alaska must submit their budgets to their municipalities, they often don't know exactly what their final revenue amount is going to be, and therefore it is typically based on projections and educated guesses. It is greatly appreciated to be able to hear at the beginning of the budget process so clearly from City Administration and the Assembly regarding your intent in the amount of our local contribution.

The City's contribution of local funding is an important part of our overall revenue. As you know, our only revenue sources for our Operating Budget can come from the City, State, and Federal governments. Since the City's allocation is only a part of our overall revenue, we are not in a position to take official action on our FY21 Budget until we have all of our revenue sources clearly identified and/or projected. That being said, I wanted to make you aware of the process we will be going through to provide some indication of the School Board's intent regarding our request for our FY21 local contribution.

At our February 5, 2020 School Board meeting, I have added an agenda item so the entire Board can discuss our intention to honor the funding request identified in Interim Administrator Hugh Bevin's memo to you on the topic of our FY21 local contribution. Although I cannot speak for the Board, I do suspect that they may share my feelings of encouragement and support for the local contribution levels identified. Not only because they indicate a clear level of support for the Sitka School District, but also because of the advanced notification and interest in working collaboratively between our two elected bodies. I will then be able to share the results of our discussion at our February 6, 2020 Special Meeting.

It eases my mind to know that one of the major revenue sources we depend upon is making it clear this early on in the process in regards to what they plan to give. The way you distribute resources reflects the things you consider priorities in this City, and I thank you on behalf of the Board for making education so obviously a high priority for you.


